

Farr is Rated as 3-1 Favorite Against Jersey Irishman

Braddock May Reach End of Boxing Trail

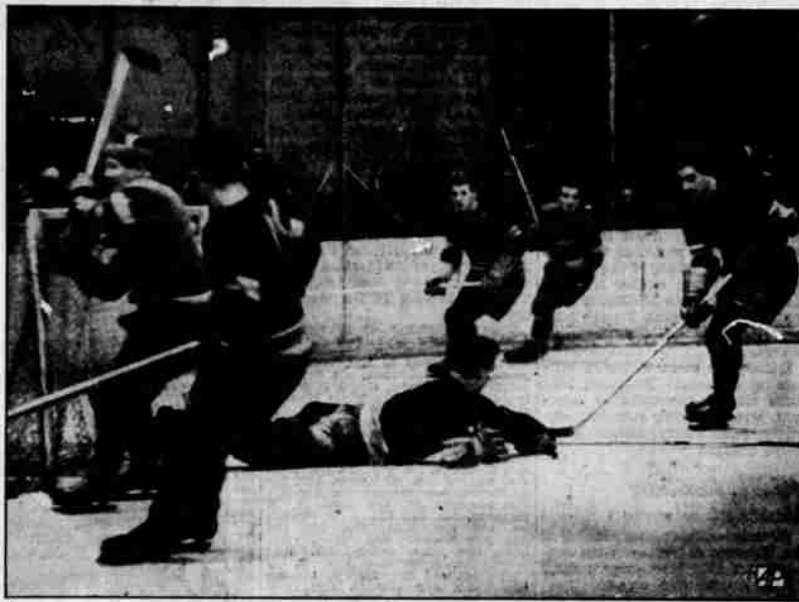
New York, Jan. 21 (AP)—James J. Braddock, having passed several crossroads in a career which has included winning and losing the world's heavyweight boxing championship, comes to what may be the final one tonight when he meets Tommy Farr of Wales in a 10 round bout.

The Welshman, who surprised everybody but himself by going the route in a title fight with Joe Louis last summer, was a 2½-1 favorite over the Jersey Irishman.

For every qualified observer who liked the chances of the popular former champion, there were two who favored the Tompandy terror. Those who favor Farr were almost unanimous in picking him to win via the kayo route.

Should Farr score a knockout it would end Braddock's career. At least, that's what Braddock says. The fight is expected to bring to Madison Square Garden an attendance of 15,000 and a gate of \$80,000.

The fight is tentatively scheduled to start at 10:15 p. m., Clem McCarthy will do the talking over the N.B.C. blue network.

District 6 Hoop Tourney Set

Dallas—Committeemen, representing the schools in district No. 6 of the state high school basketball set-up, met in McMinnville Monday for a business session. Marion county was represented by H. J. Kramer of Silverton, Polk county by R. B. Turner of Dallas, Tillamook county by Ward Hammersley of Tillamook, Washington county by I. R. Mitzler of Beaverton, and Yamhill county by William Maxwell of McMinnville.

William Maxwell was re-elected chairman and R. B. Turner was re-elected secretary. As a result of the meeting, district six will endeavor to secure two entries in the state tournament instead of one. Two places were left vacant by the withdrawal of the Portland teams. The state body will be asked to allow two entries to the district in which Eugene is located. This arrangement will permit 16 teams to take part in the tournament until the state is re-districted.

A district tournament schedule for 1938 was drafted. It will consist of two teams from Marion, two from Washington, and one each from Polk, Tillamook and Yamhill counties. The eighth team will be determined through a play-off game between the runners-up in Polk and Yamhill counties. The tournament will be played on the Linfield college floor March 10-12.

The tournament drawing resulted as follows: Washington A vs. Marion B; Marion A vs. Washington B; Tillamook vs. winner of Yamhill-Polk play-off; Polk A vs. Yamhill A.

There is a chance that the tournament will be played earlier in the month of March if arrangements can be made with the Linfield college officials. If the efforts of the committee are successful the dates will be changed to March 3-5.

Viking Crew Tests Pioneer Quintet Friday

Salem high's Vikings will return to the basketball court tonight with a launt to Oregon City, where they will attempt to keep their league slate clean at the expense of the Pioneers.

In "Anonymous League" competition thus far, the Vikings have defeated McMinnville and Tillamook, and remain with Corvallis in the undefeated class.

After a slow start this season, Coach Harold Hauk's basketballers have finally emerged as definite threats to cop the title. In cutting down the Tillamook tribe, 34 to 19, and McMinnville, 30 to 13, the Salem quintet displayed potential scoring power.

The only basis of comparison between the two clubs tonight is furnished by their respective scores against Tillamook. Oregon City lost to the Cheesemakers, 28 to 17.

In other league games, the Pioneers defeated McMinnville and lost a pair to Corvallis.

While the Salem-Oregon City embroglio will focus attention of Salem fans, the league play tonight also features tiffs between Eugene and McMinnville, and Tillamook at Corvallis.

Forced to cancel tonight's scheduled court appearance against Jesse Owens and his highly-touted negro hoop aggregation, Howard Maple's Bearcat basketballers went through an additional drill today in preparation for their clash with the greatly-strengthened Pacific Packards tomorrow night.

Bearcat Grid Team Honored

Salem sports fans turned out en masse Thursday night to pay belated homage to Spec Keene and his 1937 Willamette grid aggregation, winner of the Northwest conference title for the fourth consecutive year.

Forty-eight Bearcat gridgers who carried the burden of the winning record last fall, were honored by a gathering of 150 at the Marion hotel dining room.

Nine recipients of gold footballs, emblematic of the championship, were Art Baird, Leighton Blake, Floyd Cline, Larry Drury, Jack Haek, Johnny Kolb, Irv Miller, Justin Weakley and Bruce Williams. It was the first award made to these players.

A guest speaker for the evening was University of Oregon's Colonel Bill Hayward, track coach for over a quarter of a century.

Recalling that once he had coached here for a couple of months, Hayward paid tribute to Willamette and its "sportsmanlike athletes."

Relation of the 1938 Oregon-Willamette game, in which the Bearcats upset the favored Ducks, 6 to 0, was given by Brainerd Small, who scored the lone touchdown in that game.

Mayor V. E. Kuhn congratulated the Salem Athletic council on its recent organization, and extended an official welcome to Willamette students. The institution has received high praise throughout the state, he declared.

Also voicing approval of the Salem Athletic council, Coach Roy S. Keene introduced the graders, visiting coaches and high school athletes.

A telegram from Aaron M. Frank, Pacific coast executive of the A.A.U., was read by Toastmaster Harry Collins.

Spokesman for the squad itself was Elliott "Tootie" Becken, diminutive guard, who thanked the citizens of Salem for their interest in the football affairs of Willamette, and extended an invitation for high school athletes to attend the Bearcat institution.
