New Collections Increase Value College Museum

Mt. Angel—During the past year many new collections have been added to the Mt. Angel college museum, according to Rev. Marc Schmid, O.S.B., who has charge of assembling the specimens and who is striving to make the exhibitions as interesting and plentiful as it has been previous to the fire.

Mosaics and marble carvings, dating back to 300 A.D., from the catacombs of Rome, were donated to the museum by the Rev. Notker Maeder, O.S.B., S.T.D., shortly before his death in October.

A pleastocene tooth of a prehistoric animal found near Hallettsville, Texas, was added to the collection by Francis Neuman last November. On a close examination it was discovered that the tooth came from an Elaphas Imperator, a species of prehistoric mammoth. The tooth weighs ten pounds and is 11 inches in length and six inches in width.

While on his trip through Europe and the Holy Land, Rev. Abbot Thomas Meier, O.S.B., assembled many rare curios. This collection includes bulls from the cedars of Lebanon, Palestine; lava from the volcano of Mt. Vesuvius, Naples, an ancient oil lamp used many hundreds of years ago, and a millimeter shrapnel from Rheims, France.

Eight rare birds from India, besides oriole and humming birds of various types, are on exhibition. Among the collection of small local birds is a Japanese pheasant, Star fish of various types, colors and shapes, exceeding more than forty in number, together with several other invertebrate specimens were added to the zoological section of the museum.
