

Widow Has Plan to Warm Cold World

Candidate for Session Dies At Eugene

Eugene, April 13 (AP)—Harry H. Johnson, 50, president of the United Workers League here, candidate for the democratic nomination for state representative and a champion of the "common man," died suddenly in a hospital here last night following a heart attack brought on by a slight arm injury.

Mr. Johnson, a WPA worker, suffered the arm injury while at work on a university WPA project late yesterday. Physicians said the heart attack was caused by the shock of the injury.

Johnson had lived in Eugene since 1929, when he came here from Timber, Oregon. He was born in Brattleborough, Vt., in 1888. In his youth he joined the navy and was a member of the crew on the U. S. S. Washington during its famed round-the-world cruise.

During the past few years here, as president of the United Workers League, Johnson has been active in his defense of the interest of the common man. He appeared frequently before the city council and county court to champion their interests and his campaign for state representative was on that basis.

Interested in governmental affairs, during the last election he brought to light the fact many candidates did not properly make out expense accounts after their campaigns. He used as one of his campaign planks the intention to seek clarification of the election laws of the state.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Hazel B. Johnson; two daughters, Mrs. F. J. Kelleher of Boise, Idaho; and Mrs. Earl Gentry of Seattle; three sons, Raymond, George and Harry, all of Eugene.
