

### Bund Riot Inquiry Asked Of Congress

New York, April 21 (AP)—Congressional investigation of the activities of Rep. Samuel Dickstein (D. N.Y.), was asked by the German-American Bund today following a riot at a bund rally celebrating Adolf Hitler's 49th birthday.

Seven men, members of a group who attended the meeting wearing American Legion caps, were beaten so severely by uniformed storm troopers they required hospital treatment. Four persons were arrested.

A squad of 75 policemen fought half an hour to restrain street crowds, intent on retaliating, from invading the meeting.

The rally, held in a casino in Yorkville, Manhattan's German community, was attended by approximately 3500 members and sympathizers.

James Wheeler Hill, national bund secretary, in a telegram to Speaker Bankhead in Washington, said Rep. Dickstein, a critic of the bund, had predicted in congress there would be bloodshed if the meeting were held.

"We respectfully emphatically request," the telegram said, "immediate investigation to determine any connection of Representative Dickstein with troublemakers who attempted to cause riots at this meeting."

Jean Mathias, one of the injured, said the riot began when he rose and asked, "Will there be any English spoken here?"

"And with that," he said, "a bunch of men in Nazi uniforms jumped up and began to punch me and trample on me."

### Kilowatt Year Basis Adopted For Power Sale

Portland, April 21 (AP)—J. D. Ross, Bonneville dam administrator, formally announced yesterday that power would be sold on a kilowatt year basis, a unit system new to the United States but successfully tried in Ontario, Canada.

Ross said rates for a kilowatt year to the public utility district or private utility company which purchases Bonneville power—retail consumers can not purchase direct—would be announced soon by the federal power commission at Washington.

The kilowatt year sales unit is based entirely on the cost of production and is an attempt to leave present practices of selling power "from the old scarcity standpoint," Ross declared.

"Consumers now pay for millions of kilowatt hours of electricity they do not use," he added.

"Immense quantities of water-power are wasted over the dam because people will not pay exorbitantly high rates."

The kilowatt year was defined by

Ross as 1000 watts furnished day and night for 12 months, or 8760 kilowatt hours of electricity. He declared the low charge would inspire distributing city, company or power districts to encourage liberal customer use.

"The small consumer does not subsidize the large industrialist," said Ross. "We simply say, 'a kilowatt year costs us so much. Pay us our cost and use that kilowatt continuously day and night, throughout the year.'"

### AT & T Stockholders Criticize Report

New York, April 21 (AP)—Stockholders of the American Telephone & Telegraph company at their annual meeting yesterday unanimously approved a resolution condemning the federal communications commission report on its investigation of the company.

The resolution also took exception to the "assumption" by the FCC that its investigation was responsible for the recent lowering of rates and improvement of services.

Commenting on the 25 per cent rate reduction recommended by the FCC report, President Walter E. Gifford said, in answering a query that if such reduction were imposed "there would not be any earnings."

### Clocks Turned Hour Ahead In Six States

New York, April 21 (AP)—Residents of six states and 748 cities and towns of 11 other states will turn their clocks ahead an hour when daylight savings time goes into effect at 2 a. m. Sunday. It will be effective until September 25.

"Summer time" also is observed in Labrador and Newfoundland, 74 Canadian cities and towns, nine European nations, and to some extent in South America, Central America, New Zealand and Africa.

The six states where daylight saving time is almost universally observed are New Hampshire, recently added, New Jersey, Delaware, Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

States in which many cities have adopted the plan include New York, Pennsylvania, Maine, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Vermont, Ohio, Georgia, Idaho and Minnesota.

The greatest additions to the number of communities observing daylight saving since 1937 were made in Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ver-

mont, Maine and New Hampshire. European countries which practice daylight saving include Eire, Northern Ireland, Great Britain, France, Belgium, Holland, Portugal, Russia and Luxembourg.

Daylight saving plans, ranging from 20 minutes to an hour, also are followed in Argentina, Peru, Falkland Islands, British Honduras, New Zealand and the Gold Coast of Africa.

### Cranston Native Of Waldo Hills

Pendleton, April 21 (AP)—Charles K. Cranston, 75, former Umatilla county treasurer, who died suddenly near Salem yesterday, was an accountant, referee in bankruptcy and deputy clerk of the state supreme court.

He also acted as Pendleton correspondent for the Walla Walla Union-Bulletin.

Mr. Cranston was born in the Waldo Hills district near Salem but came to Pendleton when a young man. He was a member of the state fish and game commission under Governor Oswald West.
