Spring Garden Club Show Opens Saturday

The annual Spring flower show, sponsored by the Salem Garden club, will be held Saturday and Sunday in the show rooms of the Valley Motor company with the interested public invited to attend. There will be no charge. Salem flower lovers and many from out-of-town are expected to enter exhibits. Commercial growers will also exhibit.

Flowers to be shown must be grown by the person exhibiting with one entry in each class allowed each exhibitor. Exhibitors must provide containers and all arrangements must be in place by Saturday noon.

Following are the classifications:

Class I—Tulips, division 1—Early single and double tulips. Darwin, Breeder, Cottage and late tulips, broken tulips, which include all Bizarres, Bybloms and Rembrandts. Division 2—Best artistic arrangement of tulips in vase or basket and best arrangement of tulips with other spring flowers.

Class II—Narcissus, division 1—Best three of one named variety: yellow trumpet, white trumpet, bicolor, inconspicuous, Barri, Leeda, Jonquils and campaneolles, petals, poetique, double, miniature and special daffodils. Division 2—Best artistic arrangement of daffodils in vase or basket or with other spring flowers.

Class III—Crocus flowers, division 1—Best double st. British anemone in mixed color.

Class IV—Best rock plant feature and best collection of rock plants.

Class V—Best display of perennials in bloom and best display of new or rare plants.

Class VI—Best display of shrubs in bloom.

Class VII—Low growing flowers. Best display of pansies, violets and primulas.

Class VIII—Wild flowers, best collection of one color only; flower arrangement in bloom, as many varieties as possible.

Decorative arrangements for amateurs only will be included in Section 9.

Class 9—Flower arrangement: Artistic arrangement of short stemmed flowers in a bowl or dish; artistic arrangement of medium height flowers in a bowl or basket; container and flowers together between eight and 18 inches; container and flowers together to be over 12 inches high; flower arrangement in pewter or silver container; flower arrangement in a modernistic manner; flower arrangement of white flowers only with foliage; flower arrangement in tones and shades of one color only; flower arrangement in a glass bottle; flower arrangement in a pair of vases, containers under 8 inches; flower arrangement in a pair of vases, containers over 8 inches; best old fashioned necessity; best Japanese flower arrangement; artistic arrangement of vegetables in a suitable container (tin tray, wooden or pottery bowl, basket, etc.); artistic arrangement of vegetables and fruit, or fruit alone; combination with flowers and foliage permitted.

Class 10—Table arrangement: Occasional table with flower arrangement and any other accessories such as book, tray, etc.; children's party table; breakfast table for three; luncheon table for two or four; tea table, number not restricted.

Class 11—Miniature Garden Model—miniature garden to be shown in a box or flat. Outside dimensions not to exceed 24x36 inches.

Class 12—Garden Club Exhibit: Most effective cut flower display and most effective outdoor garden picture using a garden feature and planting.

Section 13 is Commercial—Class 1—Best display of primulas; Class 2—Best display of succulent plants, such as cactus, sedum, sempervivum, etc.; Class 3—Most effective display of rock plants, in flats or pots, varieties labeled with names; Class 4—Best display of anemones; Class 5—Best display of shrubs in bloom; Class 6—Outdoor features; Class 7—Nursery displays.

Any amateur gardener, professional gardener, commercial grower, florist, Garden club in the Willamette valley is invited to participate in the Spring Flower show.
