Official registration figures com-piled today showed that 7.924 per-sons registered other than democrat or republican, making them ineli-gible to vote in the primary election two weeks from today for candidates in either of the two party races. They may however, vote in the

They may, however, vote in the non-partisan judiciary contests. Those who lose their votes in the Those who lose their votes in the primary contests for state, county and other political offices include 941 socialists, 327 prohibitionists, 110 progressives, and 6-546 others who registered independent, communist or who refused to divulge their party affiliation.

The total of 265.132 republicans and 248.168 democrats was the same as compiled Monday by the Associated Press. The total registration, an all-time primary election record, was 521,225.
