Street Parade For Mt. Angel Opens Ritual

The dedication ceremony of the memorial hall will be made by George L. Koehn of Portland, American Legion National committeeman. At 6:30 p.m. a banquet will be served in the dining room of St. Mary's school with Charles Johnson of Salem as toastmaster and Leslie M. Scott of Portland as the principal speaker. The celebration will close with entertainment in the new hall following the banquet.

Garbage Topic Scio Council; Site is Sought

Scio—Ordinances and state laws were cited and the health hazard also was discussed at the regular meeting of the Scio council in regard to stream pollution, when it was revealed garbage is being dumped in Thomas creek in the city.

Possibility of the city's securing a suitable permanent site for garbage site was to be investigated by Councilman Cyrus.

W. E. Kyte requested the council to provide grading and graveling in his section. Kyte was requested to interest other property owners in the project. An official cleanup day was discussed.

A councilman stated that application had been made for a permit to operate logging trucks through the city Saturday afternoon, a condition not permitted by the state highway commission except on a showing of unusual conditions requiring the practice. Traffic danger to life and property from operation of trucks in the city came in for animated discussion, with the result that regulatory measures are to be strictly enforced.

Berry Festival Board to Change Fair Location

Swimming Pool Assured

Albany—Completion of the new Albany municipal swimming pool for which \$15,500 in bonds were authorized by the voters last fall, is scheduled for not later than August 1 in a resolution passed by the city council Wednesday authorizing the recorder to advertise for bids on construction.

Simultaneously the council passed a resolution authorizing the purchase of part of block No. 17, Hackleman's second addition to Albany, to be devoted to the swimming pool site and that of the city garage. The site is located between Railroad and Jackson streets, paralleling Seventh street.

The pool is to be 90 feet long and 40 feet wide, 9 feet deep at deepest end and 2 1/2 feet at the shallow end.

Albany—Application to the public works administration for a federal 45 per cent grant to finance a \$10,000 sewer repair project here will be made by the city council as the result of favorable action taken by the council Wednesday. The council had been urged by C. C.

Tax Increase For Schools Seen at Albany

Albany—Taxpayers of Albany school district No. 5, will pay an aggregate special tax of \$44,575, an increase of \$3660.15 over the total of 1937, and representing entirely expense added by an estimated 10 per cent increase of school enrollment, it is revealed by the annual Albany school budget. The addition of \$3660.15 represents very nearly the increased teaching cost contained in the estimates.

The budget contemplates no salary increases except those which result from the operation of the regular salary schedule providing for minor increases for teachers who augment their experience and qualifications.

The total budget for the year is \$144,875, an increase of \$4290.01 over the grand total for last year, but this is offset by an increase in total estimated receipts, placed for this year at \$60,300, and by minor savings effected here and there throughout the budget items.

Bonded indebtedness of the district is given now as \$189,000, showing a reduction of \$4000 during the year.

The total debt of the district is now \$205,500, as shown by the new budget, but this includes \$16,500 paid for the old Albany college campus.
