

Republicans of Polk County Organized

Independence—The Polk County Republican club was organized at a meeting of republicans held Thursday night at the county courthouse in Dallas.

The meeting was called to order by Guy Newgent of West Salem, temporary chairman, and Roy E. Barker as secretary. There were several county and state candidates present, among them M. S. Schrock, candidate for governor; Walter Norblad, candidate for congress, first district, and a representative from Portland for Clarence Wagoner, who is also a candidate for governor. These men were given 10 minutes each to present their platforms and as they were to speak at another meeting at Newberg that same evening they were given the privilege to make their talks before the regular business meeting for organization was held.

J. G. McIntosh of Independence was elected president of the club, and Roy E. Barker continued as secretary for the time being, although he requested to be relieved of the duties at an early date following the primary election. The constitution and by-laws of the club as prepared and presented by a committee on the same, were adopted with the exception that there will be eight vice-presidents instead of four as at first recommended. These eight vice-presidents were selected by ballot, and represent every district in the county, as follows: Frank Coad, Dallas; Richard Vanden Bosch of Pedee; Ira Powell of Monmouth; Dave W. Payne, Buell; Perry Wells, Buena Vista; Frank Crawford, Zena; George McCulloch, and Mrs. Elmer Cook of West Salem.

These permanent officers will hold for a year and their duties will be to organize their respective districts, and work for the good of the party with a view to promote better government, and assist the candidates in arranging meeting places in their community.

The gavel was turned over to the president by Nugent, and the rest of the evening was given over to talks by candidates present and other enthusiastic republicans. George Penison of Corvallis spoke in behalf of Dean Walker, who was unable to be present. Others speaking were Ed Hines and Ralph Howe, candidates for county surveyor; Lyle Thomas, candidate for representative from Polk county; O. E. Gillette of Monmouth, Elmer Cook of West Salem, Mrs. Peterson of Dallas, Mrs. Joe Rogers of Oak Point, Mr. Van den Bosch of Pedee, Guy Newgent of West Salem, and many others.

Soldier of Fortune Held For Burglary

Medford, May 13 (AP)—Ronald Rollo, 29, alias John Zwick, self-styled Chinese war aerial machine gunner and soldier of fortune, entered pleas of guilty to seven counts charging burglary in a dwelling, in circuit court here today.

Passing of sentence was deferred until returns upon Rollo's fingerprints could be received from the department of justice at Washington, D. C. A return from the California bureau of identification showed the prisoner, under the name of Wallace, had been detained at Sacramento for investigation and released.

It was revealed today by County Judge Earl B. Day that Rollo had been invited to speak before a noon luncheon club two weeks ago. When the speaker failed to show up it was discovered he was in jail.

The prisoner was arrested two weeks ago when found prowling about the residential section at night. Later he admitted burglaries and loot valued at \$500 was identified by owners. The district attorney says Rollo admitted 15 burglaries in this city and one each in Portland and Klamath Falls.

Rollo claims he served seven weeks on the Nanking front with the Chinese air forces, was wounded in the leg, and after a period in a military hospital was discharged. He also says he was a plantation manager in Burma. He claims Long Beach, Calif., as his home, and says he was born in Topeka, Kan.

Curb on Power Of President Is Demanded

Washington, May 13 (AP)—Anti-administration senators demanded restrictions today on President Roosevelt's control over the \$3,000,000,000 relief and public works fund voted by the house in a noisy night session.

Senator Byrd (D., Va.), frequent critic of administration measures, conferred with some of his colleagues on the possibility "earmarking" the bulky bill to limit the uses to which the money could be put. But Senator Adams (D-Colo.), chairman of an appropriations subcommittee handling the legislation, predicted it would reach the senate floor by the middle of next week without important changes.

Democratic leaders, retaining hopes of mid-June adjournment, expected senate passage in another week.

The house approved the measure last night, 329 to 70, after an unsuccessful three-day fight by republicans to modify it. Twenty-five republicans voted for the bill, while 11 democrats were among the opponents. There were no progressive or farmer-laborite votes against it. The bill appropriates \$1,250,000,000 for WPA work relief, \$965,000,000 for a new public works program under PWA, \$175,000,000 for rehabilitation of needy farmers, \$75,000,000 for the national youth administration, and \$25,000,000 for federal public buildings.

It also authorizes loans of \$500,000,000 from a PWA revolving fund, construction of \$35,000,000 worth of public buildings, and use of \$100,000,000 in RFC funds for rural electrification.

Altogether it embodies the bulk of President Roosevelt's \$4,500,000,000 program to combat the recession by expanding employment and purchasing power.

Many house democrats who supported the measure were back "on the reservation" after revolts earlier in the session against the wage-hour and government reorganization bills.

Scouts Camp In Conclave At Stayton

Close to 300 scouts will be on the ground at some time during the fourth annual camporee which will be held at Stayton this afternoon, Saturday and Sunday under the direction of Cascade council area, Boy Scouts of America. Thirty six patrols, comprising 247 scouts, have registered for the Camporee, while a number of observers will bring the total up to the 300 mark.

Each patrol will be a unit in itself, conducting its own camp, providing its own meals and competing against other units. The basis of award in connection with the camporee includes: planning 278 points, equipment 200 points and execution 525 points. Each one of these three divisions is broken down into a number of points. Under planning the patrols will be judged on packs and equipment, food and menus and camp layout. Under equipment: personal clothing, bedding and shelter, cooking and mess gear, packs and packing. Under Execution: patrol organization, cooking, fires and fuel, morale, demonstrations and exhibitions.

The camporee will be under the direction of James E. Monroe, scout executive for the area. Honorary camp chief will be Grant Murphy of Stayton. Assistants will include Martin Barber, Salem, William Evans, Cliff Lentin, Roscoe Arms and Lyle Claar.

Section leaders will be Don Doughton, Ray Talbert, Starr Reed, Walter Bushnell, Bill Barnard, Don Briggs, Ed. Gottfried will be headquarters chef.

The scouts will check in during this afternoon and the camporee will open officially at 4:30. Camp fires will be conducted Friday and Saturday nights. The break up of the camporee is fixed for 1:30 Sunday afternoon.
