

# Governor Nosed Out in Close Contest

state." Hess only said that he hoped the party would "go down the line in November."

### Lost in Multnomah

Martin's was a battle on a campaign based on suppression of labor violence. fealty to the president without "rubber stamp" submission and no quarter for radicals while Hess claimed Roosevelt administration support and CIO and AFL endorsement, the only time the two unions have agreed in Oregon.

The governor lost his battle primarily in Multnomah county, home for a third of the state's population and bitter scene of the turmoil in the labor industry. It was significant that Martin, self-styled labor champion and enemy of racketeers, lost almost every lumber county of the state, drawing most of his strength from the farm regions.

The issues upon which the voters made their choice bombarded into national attention only a week before yesterday's election after having kept Oregon at boiling point for months.

Martin, who had made himself known for his vitriolic attacks upon Harry Bridges and Harold Pritchett the respective longshoremen and timber leaders of the west for John L. Lewis' CIO, as well as bitter denunciations of the National Labor Relations Board as "impotent" and Secretary Perkins as "miserable," launched a campaign last January against labor violence.

By election day, the state-wide drive had seen the arrest of 101 persons and the sentencing of 33 to county jail and prison sentences for participation in more than 250 instances of violence, such as beatups, attempted bombings and successful ones, window smashings, truck tipovers, stench bombings, and serious fires.

Much of this followed upon the fight which started last August between the AFL and CIO for control of the 10,000 Columbia river basin loggers and sawmill employes. The remainder of it represented attempts by the AFL teamsters and some other unions to organize certain industries, such as the dry cleaners. Futile efforts of the NLRB to settle the inter-union disputes drew down Martin's fire upon it and Secretary Perkins.

Up almost to the election, this remained the issue. Then dramatically, a week before voting day, Stephen Early, secretary to the president, declared the president never recalled making a remark last fall upon his visit to Bonneville dam, which the governor quoted him as uttering. Martin said the president told him as they parted: "You and I make a good pair."

Some 48 hours later, Secretary Ickes loosed a blast calling Martin "no new dealer at heart" and Senator Carl Donagh for the democratic nomination, 42,247 to 28,887 in 1029 precincts.

Charles A. Sprague, Salem publisher, ran away with an eight man contest for the republican gubernatorial contest, topping his nearest opponent, Sam Brown, Gervasa farmer, 38,653 to 16,386 in 975 precincts.

The incumbent congressmen, Nan Wood Honeyman, Portland democrat, Walter Pierce, LaGrande democrat, and James W. Mott, Salem republican, were winning comfortably.

In the republican senatorial race, Rufus Holman state treasurer, had no trouble defeating Robert Stanfield, once Oregon's senator, 86,623 votes to 21,996 for Stanfield in 919 precincts.

Henry J. Bean appeared assured of a plurality for position No. 2, state supreme court, leading his nearest rival, Howard K. Zimmerman, 51,300 to 26,759 in 961 precincts. John W. McCulloch had 22,924; Roy R. Hewitt 21,562 and George T. Cochran 9916.

For position No. 3, J. O. Bailey had 86,638 in 924 precincts, to 32,061 for B. S. Martin. In position No. 5, Hall S. Lusk led in 943 precincts, 64,969 to 47,444 for I. H. Van Winkle and 16,025 for James T. Chinnoch.

In 972 precincts, Alex G. Barry held a vote of 25,023 for republican nomination for United States senator, short term, to 24,673 for T. McNary Weed and 18,473 for Reade M. Ireland. Robert A. Miller was unopposed for the democratic nomination.

Rex Putnam polled 33,714 votes in 1029 precincts for state school superintendent, democratic nomination, compared with 23,901 for John W. Leonhardt. Charles A. Rice is unopposed for the republican nomination.

State labor commissioner ballots gave D. H. Gram 46,397 votes in 979 precincts, to 24,918 for David F. Graham for the democratic nomination. Clarence F. Hyde polled 31,418 in 1029 precincts for the republican nomination, to 24,728 for Paul E. Roth.

### Called to Funeral

Rufus Holman, present state treasurer, is running decisively ahead of Robert N. Stanfield for the republican nomination for United States senator, with 61 Marion county precincts complete out of 80. For the short term in the United States senate Barry is running ahead of Weed with Ireland trailing.

For representative in congress James W. Mott of Salem is overwhelmingly ahead of Walter Norblad of Astoria.

### Strong for Sprague

For the republican nomination for governor Marion county is going strong for Charles A. Sprague who is nearly two to one ahead of Sam H. Brown, the closest of his seven competitors.

Charles H. Gram is decisively ahead of Graham for state labor commissioner.

The interesting race for the two state senate nominations show Senator Douglas McKay leading the field with Ronald Jones sure of the nomination in second place and Ed Keech trailing and out of the race.

### Democratic Vote

On the democratic side Marion county is registering a strong vote for Willis Mahoney for United States senator against Carl Donagh, and for representative in congress Sheriff A. C. Burk is far and away ahead of Miller and Nott.

# State Anti-Price Discrimination Bill in Effect

Oregon's anti-price discrimination bill passed by the last legislature went into effect today with filing of default order and decree in proceedings to block referendum on the bill. Secretary of State Earl Snell is perpetually enjoined under the decree from filing the referendum and is ordered to cancel the petitions and not accept them.

Proceedings to block the referendum were instituted by the state on relation of Lyle J. Page, district attorney of Marion county, with Earl Snell, secretary of state, named as defendant. On May 6 Judge Lewelling handed down an order overruling the demurrer to the complaint which had been filed by the secretary of state. The secretary of state has failed to file an answer which resulted in the default order and decree filed today, statutory time for filing of the answer having lapsed. Referendum petitions were attacked on the ground that a true and complete copy of the act wasn't attached to each of the petitions. Judge Lewelling held that this omission invalidated the referendum proceedings. One paragraph of the original act was left out of the copy of the act attached to the petitions.

The decree perpetually enjoins the secretary of state from certifying to the county clerks of the state the ballot title or number in connection with the referendum on the act which is Chapter 215 of the laws of 1937. The defendant secretary of state, says the decree, is ordered to cancel filing of the petition heretofore filed by George C. Stanley and is further ordered to refuse to file it.

# Flood Control Bill Approved

Washington, May 21 (AP)—The senate commerce committee approved today without major change an omnibus flood control bill passed by the house. The bill would authorize construction of projects to cost \$375,000,000 during the next five years.

It would retain the principle of local participation through a contribution of 30 percent of the cost of lands, easements and rights of way for reservoirs.
