

# French Bred Horse Wins 159th Running Epsom Derby

## Bois Roussel, 20-1 Shot, in Strong Finish

Epsom, Eng., June 1 (AP)—Bois Roussel, French-bred horse owned by P. Beatty, today won the 159th derby before the king and queen and some 400,000 of their subjects.

Scottish Union, owned by J. V. Rank, was second and H. E. Morris's heavily played favorite, Pasch, third in the field of 22 3-year olds.

Bois Roussel came with a rush in the stretch to finish the mile and a half four lengths in front of Scottish Union, one of the more heavily played horses. Pasch, unbeaten in his only two races, trailed by another two lengths after figuring prominently with the leaders from the start.

Ridden by C. Elliott, Bois Roussel ran the distance in two minutes 39 1/5 seconds.

Bois Roussel was a 20 to 1 shot in the betting. Scottish Union was held at 8 to 1 and Pasch at 9 to 4. Pound Foolish, owned by Lord Astor, was fourth.

Bois Roussel's victory came as a

decided surprise since Pasch had been considered a "sure thing." Pasch did not start as a two-year old, won his first race in April and then accounted for the two thousand guineas at Newmarket. He had been heavily played in the future books as well as at the track today.

The two American-owned horses, J. E. Widener's Unbreakable and William Woodward's Valerian 3rd, were among the also rans.

Five Americans held a ticket on Bois Roussel in the Irish hospital sweepstakes and won a total of \$750,000. Altogether a total of \$3,920,505 was distributed to American holders of tickets in the sweepstakes.

**U. S. Gets Out**

Washington, June 1 (AP)—The treasury figured today it would cut itself in on about \$570,000 of the \$1,925,000 won by Americans on the English derby sweepstakes.

Excluding deductions for personal exemptions, which in most cases are offset by other income, experts jotted down federal income taxes on the sweep's prizes as follows:

\$65,000 on each of the five \$150,000 first prizes.

\$17,050 on each of the eleven second prizes of \$75,000.

\$9,700 on each of the seven \$50,000 third prizes.

## Dallesandro Beats Solons With Homer

San Francisco, June 1 (AP)—Introducing—Dominick Dallesandro, the San Diego Padres' midjet outfielder with the big bat.

Hitting the scales at a mere 160 and only 5 feet 5 inches tall, the young Italian from Reading, Pa., has acquired a habit deeply resented by the seven other teams in the Pacific coast baseball league.

When San Diego needs winning runs Dominick steps into the breach and dishes up anything from a single to a home run to do the trick.

The league's fourth ranking hitter with an average of .345 in 41 games, he perturbed the leading Sacramento Solons no end yesterday when he smashed a homer, his sixth of the year, to score Al Niemle ahead of him in the first inning to give San Diego a 2 to 1 victory.

In the only other game yesterday the Hollywood Stars with Johnny Babich pitching four hit ball, defeated the cellar Oakland A's, 6 to 3. It was the 40th defeat for the A's in 52 games.

Today the remainder of the league resumes play with Los Angeles moving into San Francisco and Seattle going to Portland.

## Gehrig Starts 2001st Game Without Break

New York, June 1 (AP)—Thirteen years ago today the late Miller Huggins looked down the Yankee bench and motioned to a recruit to go in and pinch-hit.

The young busher just up from Hartford slashed out a single, and the next day he replaced Wally Pipp at first base in the Yanks' line-up. From then on Lou Gehrig has played every day. In that time he's played 2000 consecutive games, more than any other player in history. Today he is ready to play No. 2001 and he says he isn't going to stop until he makes it 2500.

Long ago Gehrig broke the previous mark of 1307 set by Deacon Scott. In 7455 times at bat, Gehrig has made 2559 hits, scored 1785 runs, hit 468 home runs, driven in 1807 runs and has a lifetime major league batting average of .343.

Gehrig clicked off No. 2000 yesterday as the Yanks came from behind to knock off the Boston Red Sox 12-5, and sweep a three-game series in the only major league game. He hit a single in the eighth to drive in a run and handled 14 chances perfectly afield.

The Yanks' iron man is now approaching 35.

Gehrig's rival first baseman, Jimmie Fox, clouted a home run with the bases loaded in the fifth but it was the Red Sox' only serious rally.

## Armstrong Licks Ross, Ambers Next on List

New York, June 1 (AP)—If you see a little blond man running today like his coat-tails were on fire and glancing back fearfully over his left shoulder every now and then, the odds are you are looking at Lou Ambers, the lightweight boxing champion, who agreed in a moment of avareice to fight Henry Armstrong this coming July.

Lou no doubt has heard how Armstrong beat Barney Ross into a bleeding, stricken pulp in 15 rounds last night at Madison Square Garden bowl to add Barney's welterweight championship to the featherweight crown he already held.

The consensus of those who sat through the slow, agonizing destruction of Ross, one of the truly great little fighters of the decade, was that Ambers had a similar fate in store as soon as he faced the relentless Los Angeles Negro.

Armstrong gave Ross such a terrible beating that Barney, the right side of his face swollen like a half-moon and his eye tightly clenched, muttered in his dressing room that he would never fight again.

It wasn't Ross' 25 years or failing legs that cost him the title. It was a left hook that for 15 rounds almost ripped his head from his shoulders.

For the last half of the fight he was intent only on lasting the distance.

He tried to fight back in flurries, but his blows after the fifth round had nothing behind them. Armstrong, amazingly strong, merely bore in the harder. At the finish he accepted his new championship completely unmarked and as fresh as paint.

If he whips Ambers, Armstrong will have captured championships in three different weight divisions in less than a year.

Last night the human pinwheel weighed 133 1/2 to Ross' 142. Even so, Armstrong was the stronger man every second of the way. He pulled Ross about in the clinches and never allowed Barney to take the play except for brief flurries. The only thing he lacked was a stiffening punch.

One cannot help but wonder if Joe Louis is not a bit gun-shy over the coming battle with Max Schmeling of Hitler-ruled Germany. Joe admits that the Teuton hit him the hardest blow he has ever been called upon to absorb. Moreover, he does not deny that the style of fighting presented by Schmeling is hard for him to solve.

"He fights sideways and he leans his head back. He's hard to get to and it's hard to nail him with a left hook," was Louis' candid statement in a recent interview. That left hook is Joe's favorite punch.

Although the negro champion claims he has figured out a way to get to his opponent, nevertheless Joe may be expected to enter the ring against der Maxis holding a few mental reservations over his ability to cope with the German's tactics.

## Hagen Flunks 42nd Tourney

New York, June 1 (AP)—A familiar name—Walter Hagen, who won the U. S. open title in 1914 and 1919—was missing for one of the few times as the field for the 42nd open golf championship was trimmed down to 180 players who will participate in the tournament proper June 9-11 at the Cherry Hills club, Denver, Colo.

Hagen, back from a year's world tour with Joe Kirkwood, the trick shot artist, was the major casualty yesterday as 102 professionals and 39 amateurs gained 141 available places in qualifying rounds held in 31 sections of the country. A field of 1194 players shot 36 holes for those places. Hagen tried to qualify at San Francisco.

A total of 170 players are now eligible for the championship—131 pros and 39 amateurs. The other 29 included those among the low 30 and ties from last year who chose to participate this year—there were only 28 who entered—with Harold S. Long, the Cherry Hills "home pro."

## Mat Experts Stage Melee

The after show was better than the main performance last night at the armory as George Wagner retained his so-called Pacific coast middleweight wrestling title. Beany Dean, not satisfied with the way matters went inside the ropes when his efforts to lift the crown went for naught, started a battle with Referee Al Sassa as they started for the dressing room. As usual the arm of the law stepped in and separated the combatants. After Dean had taken the first fall and Wagner the second, the referee got in the way of Dean as he launched a flying tackle. Sassa was apparently unable to take part in the proceedings and a member of the American Legion counted Dean out. At this point Sassa got to his feet and raised Wagner's arm. This was the signal for Dean to start his rampage and the fight was on. Other than raise the blood pressure of some of the spectators, no damage was done.

Gust Johnson lost two straight falls to Pete Sherman in the 45-minute engagement while Harry Elliott and Jimmy Heffner went to a draw in the preliminary.

## Dizzy Unable to Resume Play Yet

Chicago, June 1 (AP)—Dizzy Dean will have to give his \$185,000 right arm a few more days of rest before testing it on the mound for the Chicago Cubs.

The pitcher who pulled a muscle on his salary slipper May 3 after winning three games, visited a hospital today for a check-up by the club physician, Dr. John P. Davis, who decided "Ol Dis should wait another week or 10 days before taking a regular turn on the hill. Dean had hoped to work against Boston tomorrow.

Dr. Davis said Dean's arm showed no trace of soreness and expressed the belief a few more days of batting practice tossing would put the hurler, purchased April 16 from the St. Louis Cardinals for \$185,000 and three players, in shape to pitch in old-time style.

After playing 2000 consecutive regular games, some 600 exhibition contests, not to speak of 30 world series encounters, Lou Gehrig should be able to find his way around first base without a compass. That's a lot of ball. It indicates splendid physique as well as determination. Gehrig is well put together, but there is little doubt that he has played in many a game when he would have preferred nursing his injuries or spending a day or two on the bench, regaining strength from a minor illness.

Once a long string of consecutive games had been established, Gehrig evidently made up his mind to keep going as long as it was physically possible. Those 2000 games constitute about 3666 hours or 152 days of first basing. He has handled a lot of horsehide in that time and is 13 years older than when he started on his record June 1, 1925.

## Robert Collects \$31,950 for Win

Indianapolis, June 1 (AP)—Chunky Floyd Roberts, the Van Nuys, Calif. daredevil who had to be persuaded to drive the car that won the 26th Memorial day 500-mile speedway classic, was \$31,950 richer today.

He collected his winnings, contained in 39 checks, at the annual victory dinner sponsored, last night, by the speedway corporation.

"When Lou Moore first talked to me about driving his car, I told him I didn't think a car without a supercharger could get any place in the Indianapolis race," he said.

Wilbur Shaw of Indianapolis collected checks totaling \$14,450 for finishing second in the grind, while Chet Miller of Detroit, in third place, received \$7300.

Portland, June 1 (AP)—The golfing Zimmerman brothers, Emory and Al, turned in identical total scores yesterday to lead in Portland's sectional qualifying round for the National open tournament at Denver.

Amateurs who qualified were Don Moe, 72-75-147, and Dr. Cliff Baker, 71-76-147.

Twenty-seven players attempted to meet the requirements.

Under the terms, Armstrong cannot fight anyone anywhere except under Jacobs' promotion.

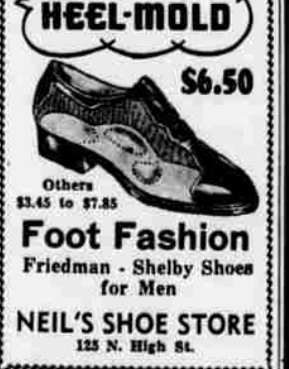
