Lebanon—Municipal band concerts every other week either in a location down town or on the high school campus are definitely scheduled through the summer months, according to Wayne Gilfray, instrumental director of Lebanon schools. At the same time the director announced that plans are now being made to hold twice-a-week instruction classes, offering courses for beginners and advanced students, through the vacation period. Pupils and parents interested in the classes are asked to attend a meeting at 7:30 in the high school music room next Tuesday evening when the tentative program will be worked out. At 8 o'clock the same evening, a meeting of prospective band members will be held.

The municipal band will be composed not only of those now members of the senior high school band but also of any other Lebanon citizens who can qualify. The concerts will feature popular numbers and will be an hour's length. Rehearsals will be held at least once a week and perhaps twice.

Forests Prove Dangerous—Lebanon—With forests in an unusually dry condition because of this winter's comparatively light snowfall, Willamette Forest officials of this district and Hill counties are taking early measures to meet the growing peril of forest fires.

The forest service has already posted a lookout on Rooster Rock and two firemen, one at Fish Lake and another at Cascadia, according to Bud Burgess, Cascadia ranger. The Hill fire patrol has stationed two men at Fish Lake and one at Swamp mountain. All other look-out and fire stations are expected to be filled by July 4.

At the same time, forest trails maintained by both the service and Hill are being rapidly cleaned out. Most major trails are now free of logs and brush, and work on them is a month ahead of last year.

Forest Traffic Heavy—Lebanon—Bud Burgess, district ranger at Cascadia, reported yesterday that Sunday travel on the west portion of the Santiam pass from all appearances was the heaviest since July 4 of last year. The four forest camps were filled to capacity and nearly every other picnic spot in the vicinity in use, he said. The scorching heat in this part of the valley was believed the reason for the heavy patronage.

Round-up Plans Started—Lebanon—Plans are being made here for the Calapooia round-up ball, the final dance in a series of three which is to be held this Saturday night on the round-up grounds near Crawfordville. In this dance the queen who is to rule over the round-up, due July 4-5, will be chosen, and also the names of her two attendants will be announced. Dancing will begin at nine to the strains of a well-known 7-piece band.



Volunteer Firemen Get Blazing Auto

His machine immediately caught fire and was driven by him to the fire hall where the volunteer firemen were meeting. The blaze was extinguished but not before considerable damage had been done though the car could be driven under its own power.

Harris Acting As Recorder For Mt. Angel

Mt. Angel—The members of the city council met Monday evening in the city hall. Mayor Berchold appointed W. D. Harris to act as recorder during the temporary absence of P. N. Smith who is ill, and Walter Smith was appointed to continue with the water books.

Joseph L. Wachter, chairman of the water committee, made a report on water repairs and improvements. The street committee chairman, John Bigler, reported that the work of grading on Pershing street, West Charles street, Sheridan street, Oak street, Otto street, May street, Cleveland street and Market street had been completed and that all the streets were well taken care of in the line of repair.

A report was made by W. J. Kloft, chairman of the judiciary committee, that the Portland General Electric company had presented a form of ordinance for a new franchise for lighting the city. It was a suggested trade of the present site of the transformer for a new franchise without any concession or reduction in rates. The council suggested that an amended ordinance be submitted to the P. G. E. company.

M. A. Bigler reported on the pressing need of providing the city with an additional water supply and protecting it against a possible breakdown. Victor Frey said that the street lamp at the corner of Main and Charles streets was broken and should be replaced. He also stated that in certain sections of town it was necessary to make an after-curfew round-up.

A report was made by Morris Fuchs who stated that he had made a number of arrests for traffic violations and who also suggested that the city put up a proper stop sign at Main and Charles streets. J. L. Wachter was instructed to secure a sign for that corner.

The city recorder was ordered to draw up a proper petition for the electors of the district who sought to be within the city limits.

Gore District Man Ends Life in Canal

Lebanon — Albert Thorman, 74-year-old farmer living in the Gore district, took his own life yesterday when he jumped into the swift waters of the Albany canal after tying a rope around his body and to the guard rail of the bridge. Attempts to resuscitate him by members of the Lebanon fire and police departments proved fruitless. No reason was immediately apparent for his action, it being understood he was in good health and in good shape financially. Packages containing his possessions were addressed to his survivors, among them Mr. and Mrs. Fred Warnke, his son-in-law and daughter, and to their children, all of whom lived nearby. The body is in the Lowe mortuary.
