### Congress Quits Wednesday

#### Advertising Praised by FDR And Coughlin

**Priest Declares Religion Believes in Ads—Roosevelt Says It Aids Recovery**

Detroit, June 13 (AP)—Father Charles E. Coughlin told the Advertising Federation of America at its convention here today that the Bible is replete with evidence that "religion believes in advertising."

On the same program, Edward F. McGrady, former assistant secretary of labor, warned his audience that American industry, while making vast contributions to humanity, has lagged behind labor in presenting its virtues to the public.

At the opening session of the Federation's thirty-fourth annual convention, a message was read from President Roosevelt praising the convention slogan: "Advertising makes work."

The president's message asserted that "if advertising is to render the maximum of constructive service, it is fundamental that truth be the watchword and that every claim be supported by the highest standard of business ethics."

**Bible Advertising**  
Father Coughlin told the advertisers that miraculous occurrences described in the Bible "outshine all modern signs."

"The angels' choir, which announced to the shepherds the good tidings on the hills of Bethlehem, the rainbow which the hand of God painted in the ancient Heaven—these are but symbols of the advertising which should characterize the profession of today," said the Royal Oak priest.

He suggested that advertisers "could perform valiant Christ-like service by refusing to deal with publications which profit by disseminating the seeds of discord in the minds of millions of readers." He also urged them "to institute a campaign for expurgating not only untruthful statements relative to advertising products, but the growing tendency of glorifying sexuality, immorality and Corinthian appeal, all of which too often is paraded as art before the assimilated minds of the thoughtless public."

**Pleads for Religion**  
Describing Christ as "the real progressive," Father Coughlin appealed for the utilization of his principles to avert in this country the dissolution which overtook other great nations.

"I plead with you," he said, "in this crisis where Christianity and chaos are now found in mortal combat and when we are playing for the stakes of our nation's preservation with its liberties and its constitution—I plead with you to remember that Christianity is more than a Sunday ceremony."

"I recognize the important position the service of advertising occupies in our national economy," said a message of greeting from President Roosevelt, "a strategic relationship that carries responsibility for the endeavor to maintain production through wider and more efficient distribution of the goods produced."

"To this end, your convention theme, 'advertising makes work' is great significance. Recovery will be accelerated and human happiness promoted in proportion to the speed of purchasing power through the employment of the greatest possible number of our workers in gainful pursuits."

"Certainly, if advertising is to render the maximum of constructive service, it is fundamental that truth be the watchword and that every claim be supported by the highest standard of business ethics. I believe the readers in this field sense their opportunity for promoting social and economic progress through trustworthy service."

#### Agricultural Fund Bill Approved

Washington, June 13 (AP)—Senate approval sent to the White House today a record agricultural appropriation bill of \$1,000,000,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

The measure included \$500,000,000 for benefit payments to farmers under the crop control act.

#### Anking Taken By Japanese In Swift Thrust

**Rising Flood Waters of Yellow River Threaten Disaster to Invaders**

Shanghai, June 13 (AP)—Powerful Japanese land and river forces today captured Anking, capital of Anhwei province, in a swift thrust up the Yangtze river toward Hankow, China's provisional capital, less than 200 miles farther inland.

Rising flood waters of the Yellow river, imperiling Japan's offensive through Honan province, increased the possibility that the drive by land and water up the Yangtze may become the main attack on China's seat of government.

A Japanese army spokesman acknowledged that fighting in the Chengchow sector, where Japanese are besieging the junction of the Lunghai and Peiping-Hankow railroads, was being hampered by mud and rain.

**Floods Over Railroad**  
Actual flood conditions do not exist yet, however, he declared.

Japanese army engineers said the Yellow river had risen 15 feet but must rise another 15 before the situation could be considered perilous.

According to official Chinese dispatches from Hankow, the floodwaters already have crossed the vital east-west Lunghai and are flowing southeast toward Anhwei.

If supply lines are cut off by the flood, they declared, the Japanese could not press their Lunghai campaign.

Actual occupation of Anking, Japanese reports said, was achieved by infantry which was put ashore from transports and advanced on the provincial capital from the east and northeast after Japanese warships shelled the city from the river.

**Dramatic Capture**  
The attack on Anking was described as one of the most dramatic of the war, with thick swirling river fog shielding the warships' movements more effectively than smoke screens.

With the ships only vaguely silhouetted at times, the Chinese shore batteries were virtually useless, witnesses reported.

A fleet of minesweepers preceded the main naval force and transports to a place about 10 miles east of Anking where the first landing party was sent ashore.

**Miss Julia Webster Injured in Crash**  
McMinnville, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Don Lesley and Don Schmidt, both of Portland, are held in the county jail on open charges as result of an accident on highway 18 Saturday night.

Sheriff O. W. Manning said their car, driven by Schmidt, side-swiped the car of Miss Julia Webster, Salem, a delegate to the state Business and Professional Women's club convention. She was injured slightly. Manning said he found a bottle of gin in the men's car.

#### American Warships Remain on Yangtze

Shanghai, June 13 (AP)—The United States government today informed Japan it had no intention of curtailing the activities of American warships on the Yangtze river to clear the path for the Japanese drive toward Hankow.

The warships, Washington told the Japanese through Admiral Harry E. Yarnell and Frank P. Lockhart, consul general at Shanghai, were there to protect American lives and property.

It was learned authoritatively that Lockhart, in replying to a warning from Masayuki Tani, Japanese ambassador-at-large in China, pointed out that the warships would continue to be sent anywhere deemed necessary to carry on their protective duties.

The United States gunboat Mocmacy remained at Kluikiang, Yangtze port at the upper limit of what Japanese naval authorities Saturday designated as a "danger zone."

#### Attacked by Pet Donkey

Newport, June 13 (AP)—Jack Tepolt doesn't think he looks like a dog but that is the only way he was able to explain why a pet donkey of his children attacked him.

Tepolt, bending over, was seized by the chin by the donkey, which began to stamp. Inserting his hand in the animal's mouth, Tepolt freed himself before he was trampled, although his chin and hand were lacerated.

The children have always found the donkey docile and Tepolt said the only explanation he could give for the attack was the fact that dogs have teased the animal and, in his bending position, the donkey mistook him for a dog.

#### Gillette Guest At White House

Washington, June 13 (AP)—President Roosevelt sometimes uses a handshake or a pat on the shoulder to demonstrate his support of a candidate, but Senator Gillette (D., Iowa), got a five-course luncheon at the White House.

The two men, doffing their coats because of the hot weather, talked over yesterday the Iowa primary election in which Gillette defeated Rep. Wearin, whom several administration advisers had favored.

Their meeting provided a broad hint to Iowa Democrats that the president wanted harmony in the party. Gillette said Mr. Roosevelt congratulated him and predicted his election over former Senator L. J. Dickinson, republican.

They agreed, Gillette added, that Dickinson's nomination had clearly drawn the issue between "progressivism and conservatism."

The Iowa's visit to the White House stirred up speculation on the question of how far the administration would go in supporting anti-Roosevelt Democrats who might win senatorial nominations.

#### Used Cleopatra As Inspiration

Portland, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Syd D. Pierce, 53, editor of the Bend Free Press, today told Assistant U. S. Attorney Mason Dillard he didn't have knowledge of the nation's obscene literature laws and told a reporter "if they convict me for this they'll be taking away the freedom of the press."

Pierce was booked at Multnomah county jail Sunday, brought here from Bend by Deputy Marshal William H. Rickard. He is charged with sending obscene matter through the mail. Statements forming basis for the complaint are directed at the private life of Robert F. Sawyer, Bend Bulletin publisher and Oregon Public Servant.

The federal charge complains specifically of paragraphs contained in the May 20 issue of the Free Press, although attacks have been made in following weekly editions. Pierce told Dillard he got inspiration for word usage in certain paragraphs from "books about Cleopatra and such."

Pierce was arrested in a Bend poolroom Saturday night. He waived preliminary hearing before U. S. Commissioner H. C. Ellis and was bound to the grand jury. Bail is \$5000, an amount he is anxious to raise that he may return to Bend to issue his Friday edition. His wife assists him as a linotype operator.

#### Railroad Aid Abandoned For Session

**Barkley States Loans to System Dropped, Congress to Rush Through**

Washington, June 13 (AP)—Senate Leader Barkley (D., Ky.) told reporters after a conference with President Roosevelt today that congress would adjourn Wednesday without enacting "any new" railroad legislation.

"Since we expect to adjourn not later than Wednesday night we do not contemplate that there will be any new railroad legislation this session," Barkley said.

The democratic leader said specifically that a bill to liberalize reconstruction corporation loans to railroads was not on the program to be completed before adjournment.

**Balk at Wage Cut**  
That measure once was reported to the senate by its banking committee, but was sent back to committee when the railroads proposed a 15 percent wage cut.

The White House conference was attended by Vice-President Garner, Speaker Bankhead and Representative Rayburn (D., Tex.), house majority leader.

Abandonment of rail legislation would leave enactment of wage-hour legislation as the key to adjournment.

Other measures on which action must be completed before the session ends are the relief bill and a deficiency appropriation bill. No delay in action on them is anticipated by congressional leaders.

In asserting congress would adjourn by Wednesday night, Barkley said this could be done "unless there is a hook-up we don't foresee."

Opposition of railroad unions to the RFC lending bill has kept it in the senate committee. Although Barkley said no effort would be made to pass the measure, informed senators said they understood the railway labor executives association would meet tomorrow to reconsider their opposition.

#### Japan Regrets Bombing School

Hongkong, June 13 (AP)—Japan today expressed regret that the lives of American members of the staff of American-owned Lingnan university had been endangered and a Chinese employee of the university had been killed in Japanese air raids on Canton.

This was contained in a note transmitted to Addison E. Southard, United States consul-general here, by the Japanese consulate-general, replying to Southard's protest against the raid of June 8, during which three bombs fell on the university campus.

The reply repeated previous requests that American property be identified by flags prominently displayed on the roofs.

Similar notes handed British authorities and the French consul-general here said their complaints against Japanese planes flying over the British and French concessions on Shamen island, Canton, were being investigated.

These replies said Japanese fliers were being instructed again to avoid such flights.

Chinese dispatches said Japanese planes had heavily bombed Maoi, Chinese naval base near Poochow, between Hongkong and Shanghai.

#### Speed Causes Crash Injuring Three

Medford, June 13 (AP)—An auto driven by John Elwood Freeman, 44, of Bakerfield, Calif., left the Crater Lake highway near this city Sunday afternoon late, and turned over three times before it stopped. Freeman was uninjured. His daughter, Dorothy, 11, sustained a broken nose. His son, John, 10, a sprained shoulder, and his wife severe shock. The injured were brought to a local hospital. State police said the mishap was due to speed. The Freemans have been vacationing in the Trail district.

#### Sudeten Nazi Victorious in Sunday Election

**Vote 90.9 Percent Nazi —Czechs to Submit Proposals for Autonomy**

Europe came through another uncomfortable weekend, wearing the tattered mantle of an uneasy peace, with Czechoslovakia's boisterous Germanic minority in a triumphant mood over a 90.9 per cent Nazi victory in Germanic communities which voted in yesterday's local elections.

With a pro-Nazi overwhelming demonstrated by the Sudeten Germans in yesterday's voting and on two previous election Sundays, Czechoslovakia approached a decision on what concessions to make in response to Sudeten demands for outright autonomy.

The government prepared to submit its proposals tomorrow, tensely aware that Adolf Hitler, avowed "protector" of the Sudetens, was watching across a border half engulfing the young Central European republic.

British Prime Minister Chamberlain, with a vital stake in both the Spanish war and the Czechoslovak-German situation, faced a trying week.

The influential times of London proposed a fresh cabinet re-shuffle in which Chamberlain would delegate more responsibility to his ministers.

Tomorrow when Parliament reconvenes, British legislators will want to know how Chamberlain plans to halt Spanish insurgent air attacks on British shipping.

#### Plan Expansion Of University

Construction of a new science hall and a men's dormitory is included in a five point expansion program which was outlined Saturday afternoon during the spring session of the board of trustees at Willamette university. Construction of both buildings is dependent upon the availability of the necessary funds.

Additional goals include a 200 increase in the student body, bringing the total to 1000, a corresponding boost in faculty and an increase in endowment from \$1,700,000 to \$3,000,000. All board officers were re-elected.

John L. Gary, West Linn, was elected president of the Willamette university alumni association during the banquet held at the First M. E. church Saturday evening following the graduation exercises. Harold Hauk of Salem was named first vice-president; Dr. Verne D. Bain, Salem, second vice-president; Owen Gallaher-McCullough, Salem, third vice-president; Frank Bennett, Mildred Atkinson and Donald Grant, executive committee; H. E. Eakin and Earl Nott, trustees, and Fay Sparks, secretary-treasurer.

#### Woman Aids Escape Of Texas Convicts

Sugar Land, Texas, June 13 (AP)—A woman, who drove an automobile through a barrage of rifle bullets, aided three convicts who escaped from the Harlem state prison farm today.

The woman was at the wheel of a parked car when the prisoners, employed on a farm, were marched out of their quarters shortly after daybreak. The three men broke from the ranks and ran to the car. Guards fired but the men reached the car. As they tumbled inside the woman got it into gear and raced for the paved highway which passes the farm.

The convicts were Claude Jett, 20, serving 15 years for criminal assault; Ira McCoy, 19, serving three years for assault with intent to rob; and J. Smith, 18, serving two years for theft.

Capt. A. N. Owens, farm manager, led the search. Highways were blocked and back roads watched, but the girl apparently had reached a hide-away.

**Cost of Trees Estimated**  
Portland, June 13 —It would cost \$3,001,210 to preserve timber along major Oregon roads and \$900,000 along secondary roads, the state planning board estimated.

#### Grand Jury Hears Kidnap Witnesses

Miami, Fla., June 13 (AP)—A special grand jury was empaneled today to consider evidence against Franklin Pierce McCall in connection with the kidnaping of James Bailey Cash, Jr., but illness of State Attorney George A. Worley delayed action on the case until tomorrow. The jury elected a foreman and took up other matters presented by an assistant prosecutor.

Circuit Judge H. F. Atkinson, in his charge made no specific reference to the kidnaping, telling the jurors they were to "consider such major felonies as have been committed."

An uncle of McCall whose name was not disclosed arrived from Jasper, Fla., today to visit him. He was the first visitor the 21-year-old truck driver had since federal agents announced he had confessed the single-handed abduction of "Skokie" Cash.

The blue-eyed, sandy-haired boy, five-and-a-half years old, was snatched from his crib in Princeton May 28. Twelve days later his pajama-clad body was found in a palm-tree thicket barely a mile from his home.

James Bailey Cash, Sr., paid \$10,000 ransom two days after his child was stolen, not knowing that he already lay dead among the saw-toothed leaves of Florida's scrub palmettos. The money was recovered with exception of \$5.

Sheriff D. C. Clemas, who first arrested McCall and turned him over to agents of the federal bureau of investigation, said the \$5,000 offered as rewards by a newspaper, the city of Miami beach and others, would be returned to the donors.

#### Nazarene Church To be Enlarged

Trustees of the Nazarene church, 13th and Center streets, today took out a permit at the office of City Building Inspector E. C. Bushnell to make alterations to the church, to cost an estimated \$7000.

The church has bought the lot immediately east of the church on Center, and a house occupying the property is being moved today. The addition will be by way of enlarging the main auditorium of the church and providing Sunday school rooms. It will be of frame construction conforming to the present building.

Other permits today were: Adolph Hillman, to alter a 1½-story dwelling and garage at 2170 Berry, \$150; Mrs. B. F. Taylor, to alter a one-story dwelling at 2026 State, \$1400; T. L. Ross, to repair one-story dwelling at 1050 North 19th, \$25.

#### Drive to Unionize Willamette Mills

Vancouver, Wash., June 13 (AP)—A drive to gain 100 percent union organization in Willamette valley sawmills was voted by the Oregon-Washington Council of Lumber and Sawmill workers at a special session here yesterday.

In a resolution scheduling the drive, the Willamette valley district was described as the weak link in the lumber wage situation with mills in that area paying as low as 30 cents an hour in contrast to the union scale of \$5 for an 8-hour day.

The council asserted that cutting of wages is not the solution to the lumber industry's problems.

#### Missing Since March 1 With Nine Aboard

**Ship Vanished in Storm—Miner Finds Wreckage And Bodies of Victims**

Yosemite, Calif., June 13 (AP)—A young hunter of gold who followed his "hunch" led the way today to the wreckage of a storm-felled TWA airliner missing with nine persons aboard since the night of last March 1.

The shattered plane and the bodies of its occupants lay near the top of 9,000-foot Buena Vista peak, 18 air miles south and east of Yosemite valley ranger headquarters. The region, one of the wildest in the Sierra Nevada, is 90 miles east of Fresno.

H. O. Collier, 34, a mining prospector from Fresno, told chief ranger Forest Townsley last night he had found the ship Sunday morning. Eight bodies were scattered nearby, said Collier.

As evidence he had found the plane, Collier produced an aviator's cap with the TWA insignia and a brief case stamped with the name of H. M. Salisbury of Kansas City, Mo. TWA co-pilot and a passenger on the ship.

**Lost in Storm**  
The ship vanished in one of the worst California storms in several decades. Pilot John Graves had abandoned efforts to fly eastward over the Sierras to Albuquerque, N. M., and had been balked in an attempt to fly southward to Burbank, Calif., when he turned northward hoping to return and set the ship down at San Francisco.

A radio message was received when the ship was near Fresno, but shortly afterward the plans disappeared. For weeks planes and searching parties sought it vainly.

Wallace, 29, of Tucson, Ariz.; Martha M. Wilson, Philadelphia, stewardess.

#### Compromise on Pump Priming

Washington, June 13 (AP)—A joint conference committee agreed late today on a compromise draft of the administration's multi-billion dollar relief bill.

Two items in the bill—\$212,000,000 for additional farm benefits and \$1,000,000 for administrative expenses—were returned to the house for a separate vote because they were not included in the house-approved bill.

If these are accepted, the relief program will aggregate \$3,753,000,000 compared with \$3,723,000,000 approved by the senate and \$3,154,000,000 approved by the house.

The additional \$300,000,000 added by the committee was for federal public buildings.

The senate bill had provided \$5,000,000 for this purpose.

#### Shift Flood Control Costs to Government

Washington, June 13 (AP)—That President Roosevelt had approved proposals shifting the entire cost of flood control reservoirs on the federal government was heard from usually informed sources in the national capital.

This policy would force further changes in the omnibus flood control bill now before a conference committee for action on senate amendments rejected by the house. It would reduce from 100 to 30 per cent present local contribution requirements covering lands, easements and rights of way.

Word the president had acceded to abandonment of the principle of local payments for reservoirs contained in the 1936 omnibus flood control bill circulated after conference sought White House counsel on the senate amendments.

A house member opined Mr. Roosevelt had been influenced by a senate amendment to vest the
