Bend, Ore., June 13 (AP)—William M. Slusher, 29, Mowich, Ore., died Saturday night in a hospital here of a fractured skull, suffered earlier in the evening when his car left the Dalles-California highway four miles north of Bend and plunged into the lava rocks. A companion, William Cramer, also of Mowich, escaped with minor injuries. The death was central Oregon's first highway fatality of the year.

Bankers Told Pump Priming No Solution

Corvallis, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Pump-priming is no solution to the present difficulties in finance, Clyde E. Williamson, Albany, state president of the Oregon Bankers' association, told members at the opening session of the state convention today.

"Pump-priming cannot take the place of confidence nor recapture thrift and self-reliance for the American people," he said.

"We are faced on every hand by debt problems in private and national life. The loose thinking and habits developed make more difficult the problems of the bank. The easy payment plan is the easy way. It is time bankers began discouraging debt for every thing but necessities. Debt hangs as a millstone around necks, and robs the individual and the family of otherwise happy moments.

"The abundant life idea needs to be punctured. Have everything the other fellow has and even more. What an ideal! It is time to call a halt to such foolish notions encouraged by misleading propaganda. The abundant life is possible only for the most careful people. Loose financial thinking is another bad idea. It is easier to finance an automobile than a home because of this distorted financial thinking. The trend toward paternalism is also bad.

"Many old ideas on banking are out-moded," Williamson warned. "Banking now ranks as a profession that needs deep and constant study."

Williamson praised the sponsorship by banks of 4-H clubs and other organizations designed to get people back into the habit of being themselves and away from the idea the government owes them a living.

Warships to Visit Cities Along Coast

San Diego, Cal., June 13 (AP)—Practically every coastal city along the Pacific, including three Alaskan ports, will be visited by at least one United States warship during the Fourth of July holiday this year. It was announced at eleventh district naval headquarters today.

The largest holiday concentration will be at Seattle, where the dreadnaught California, Tennessee, West Virginia and Maryland will anchor in Elliott Bay.

At San Francisco the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, flagship of Admiral Claud C. Bloch, commander in chief of the fleet, will be at anchor.

Other assignments include: Santa Monica, Cal., light cruiser Concord; Santa Cruz, Cal., dreadnaught Colorado; Santa Barbara, Cal., aircraft carrier Lexington and heavy cruiser New Orleans; Crescent City, Cal., destroyer Phelps; Ocean Side, Cal., destroyer Chandler; Huntington Beach, Cal., light cruiser Milwaukee; Redondo Beach, Cal., heavy cruiser Minneapolis; Stockton, Cal., destroyers Jarvis and Patterson; Monterey, Cal., aircraft Ranger; Eureka, Cal., destroyer Worden; Raymond, Wash., destroyer Hull; Hoquiam, Wash., destroyer MacDonough; Blaine, Wash., heavy cruiser Vincennes; Everett, Wash., heavy cruiser Northampton; Port Townsend, Wash., heavy cruiser Pensacola; Bellingham, Wash., heavy cruiser Astoria; North Bend, Ore., destroyer Dewey; Sitka, Alaska, heavy cruiser Louisville; Cordova, Alaska, heavy cruiser Chester; and Seward, Alaska, heavy cruiser Salt Lake City.

Medics Attack Socialization

San Francisco, June 13 (AP)—The American Medical association opened its 89th annual convention here today with a denunciation of socialized medicine and with a plea for continued co-operation of social, civic and state agencies in the campaign against syphilis.

Seven thousand medical leaders heard Dr. J. H. J. Upham, of Columbus, O., association president, condemn "imposition of any European scheme of socialized practice."

He urged preservation of the "individuality of medical practice" as the best suited to this country.

Dr. Irvin Abell, of Louisville, Ky., the association's president-elect for 1938-39, denounced the attitude of "socially minded statesmen would supply medical care at government expense with a lowering of the efficiency, and per chance integrity, of a part of the medical profession."

The association's bureau of medical economics delivered a report condemning the "reformers who would socialize medicine." The report also criticized the federal government for helping finance the Group Health Association, Inc., formed by employees of the Home Owners' Loan corporation in Washington, D. C.

Conference of Music Clubs Opens

Portland, Ore., June 13 (AP)—With nearly every state west of the Rockies represented, the National Federation of Music Clubs opened its first all-western conference here today.

The program for the opening session included welcoming address by Mayor Carson and Mrs. M. D. Spencer, national board member. Mrs. Kate Dell Marden, Oregon president, called the session to order. Following the president's address and other speeches, a panel discussion on the obligations of a music club to its community was directed by Mrs. Lynn C. Wright of North Bend, Wash. Among guests of honor introduced were Mrs. Vincent Hillier Ober of Norfolk, Va., the club's national president.

Asks Revision of Nationality Laws

Washington, June 13 (AP)—President Roosevelt transmitted a special message to congress today recommending consideration of revision and codification of U. S. nationality laws.

His message was accompanied by a report on the nationality statutes. "The report," he said, "indicates the desirability from the administrative standpoint, of having the existing nationality laws now scattered among a large number of separate statutes embodied in a single, logically arranged and understandable code. Certain changes in substance are likewise recommended."

Nationality laws referred to in Mr. Roosevelt's message deal with the whole subject and effect of naturalization statutes.

Bend Editor Jailed For Obscene Matter

Portland, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Charged with sending obscene matter through the mails, Syd D. Pierce, editor of the Bend Free Press, was arrested in Bend Saturday and held on \$3000 bail.

Pierce was arrested on a complaint signed by United States Attorney Carl C. Donaghy based on statements carried in the Free Press on May 29, attacking the private life of Robert W. Sawyer, Bend Bulletin publisher.

The complaint states the Free Press contained matter of an obscene, lewd, lascivious, indecent and filthy character, the contents of which are too obscene to set forth in this complaint and spread upon the records of this court.

Gaylord Kahn Killed in Crash

Vancouver, Wash., June 13 (AP)—Gaylord Kahn, 19, Portland, was instantly killed Sunday when his speeding car plunged through a guard rail into a gravel pit near here. Three other occupants of the car, including the victim's sister, escaped with minor injuries.

Deficiency Bill Reported Out

Washington, June 13 (AP)—The senate appropriations committee today reported to the senate a \$279,414,870 final deficiency bill, providing \$36,314,000 to launch the naval expansion program, including \$300,000 to start construction of a \$3,000,000 dirigible.

The senate committee increased the naval building fund by \$512,000, mostly to be devoted to dirigible construction. The house had eliminated the dirigible item from the bill.

The senate increased the total appropriations carried in the measure approximately \$1,792,000 over the house figure.

Major items in the bill are \$94,000,000 to restore capital impairment of the commodity credit corporation, \$40,000,000 for refunds to states of federal employers' taxes under the social security act, \$50,000,000 for the refund of processing taxes, and the naval expansion funds.

A house item of \$1,000,000 for reconstruction and repair of roads, buildings and other flood damaged facilities in the national forests of California was retained by the senate committee. Another house item of \$40,000 for similar purposes in the national parks of the state was retained.

The naval fund will permit beginning construction of two new battleships—making six dreadnaughts under construction—two light cruisers and seven auxiliaries.

Newport Seeking County Seat

Newport, June 13 (AP)—A petition has been filed with the Lincoln county court for placing on the November ballot a measure to move the county seat from Toledo to Newport, removal to take place, if carried, January 1, 1940.

This is the third attempt to move the county seat.

Human Bones Found Under Porch

Medford, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Human bones were found beneath the trap door on the back porch of a house being removed by Lee Williams, contractor, from a Portland avenue location. The bones consisted of a portion of the pelvis, upper legs and arms of an adult woman. Newspapers under the porch bore 1935 dates but examination indicated the bones had been there for many years.

Portland, Ore., June 13 (AP)—A four-way romance that started in the University of Oregon Medical school reached the altar Sunday when the Brothers Neilson, twins, married the sisters Schwichtenberg, twins.

Dr. Ronald Neilson married Marian Schwichtenberg and Dr. Duncan Neilson married Lillian Schwichtenberg. The brides are 27, internes at Multnomah county hospital, and sons of Robert Neilson, Sr., of Grants Pass. The twin brides are 24, practicing bacteriologists, and daughters of Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Schwichtenberg, Portland.

Fleeing Man Killed by Officer

Portland, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Shot while driving a car reported stolen, Wilbur Robert Erbes, 23, died at the Good Samaritan hospital early yesterday from a wound inflicted by Detective S. S. Heath.

Erbes allegedly attempted to run down Heath when Heath and Detective W. A. Peterson tried to stop the car he was driving. Heath reported the leaped aside and fired once.

The wounded man drove on about two blocks and was found slumped over the wheel of the halted car in the midst of a Rose Festival crowd.

Erbes was released from the Multnomah county jail in May after serving 60 days on a car-theft charge. Police held his roommate, Don E. Carlson, 21, pending investigation.

Education on Trial Declares Prof. Dugdale

Education is on trial today more than at any other period in history, Ralph E. Dugdale, superintendent of the Portland public schools, told the chamber of commerce today noon in discussing the practical aspects of education. Realization is being reached that education in the schools is only a beginning and must continue into adult life with the purpose of the schools to lay a foundation as to the acquisition of knowledge and the approach to specific problems, he said.

Industry need not be apprehensive that youth will replace experienced adults, not flood the market with cheap labor. Vocational education serves to teach coordination between the mind and muscle and the fundamental principles of accuracy, Dugdale continued. As applied to the 2600 Portland boys in this field, he said that these are boys who prefer the practical in line with their capabilities and interest, along with the broadening of the individual's horizon so that the cultural things of life may be enjoyed.

The next great frontier is the social frontier, he said, much criticism being directed against the schools for a lack of instruction in the social aspects and the ability to live cooperatively with other individuals. There is a need for more education in local and civic interests and a greater respect for law and order. In spite of the depression, the boys and girls of today have more opportunity to develop leadership and character than ever before and they must be willing to assume responsibilities.

Reversals of Circuit Courts

Washington, June 13 (AP)—A survey by the department of justice revealed today that all of the 16 cases of the third circuit court of appeals at Philadelphia which reached the supreme court during the 1937-38 term were reversed.

The justice department figures were compiled in preparing annual reports to congress. They revealed that only one circuit court—the second at New York—had been sustained more times than it had been reversed. It suffered 11 reversals. Twelve times the supreme court sustained its decisions.

The third circuit court for several years has been the subject of administration criticism as "the most reactionary in the country." Until three retirements this spring, all of its members were more than 70 years old.

Running a close second to the third circuit in reversals was the ninth circuit, which includes California, Montana, Idaho, Arizona, and the territories of Alaska and Hawaii. That court was reversed 14 times by the supreme court last year, but was sustained in three cases.

Student Admits Part in Burglary

Eugene, June 13 (AP)—Don Davis, 20, University of Oregon student has admitted complicity in a recent Eugene burglary, Sheriff O. A. Swartz said. Another student, Clarence Sebastian, was arrested earlier last week at San Jose, Calif., in connection with the same crime. Swartz said that Davis, when arrested Friday, had part of the loot from a Eugene sporting goods store in his possession. He is held in the county jail in lieu of \$500 bail.
