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School Patrons Name Directors, Approve Budget

Mt. Angel—At the regular school meeting of school district No. 91, J. J. Keber was re-elected director for a three year term and John Diehl was re-elected clerk.

The district voted a special tax of \$2763.27, according to the budget for the fiscal school year, beginning June 20, 1938, and ending June 20, 1939. Frank Hynes received the total vote cast for director for zone No. 2 for the non-union high school district as no other candidate was up for the office.

They also voted to authorize the directors to enter into a lease with St. Benedict's Abbey for the use of the new gymnasium after school hours.

Dallas Approves Levy
Dallas—One of the smallest votes ever cast in a school election here was cast Monday when J. A. Inglis and A. R. Hartman, candidates to succeed themselves on the board of directors with no opposition, received 67 and 62 votes respectively. Vote on the levy was 52 for and 9 against.

Barnum New Director

A total of 106 votes was cast in strong contrast to last year's meeting when 44 voters attended. Lawrence Edwards was unopposed and received 103 votes. The contest for clerk was more closely fought, with Mrs. Miller receiving 63 to 44 for Riches.

Keizer Elects Three
Keizer—The annual budget meeting and school board election was held at the school, with a fair sized crowd attending. L. E. Weeks presided over the meeting. Obid Froley, who has served on the board during the past two years, tendered his resignation because of ill health. Howard Smalley, Sr., who has served for one year as director, also resigned, and L. E. Weeks, who has served for three years, stated he was not a candidate for re-election. David Saucy, Paul Pierce and Harry Peary were elected to succeed them.

Mrs. Ruth Ruffison was re-elected clerk. The budget was adopted and \$800 allowed for the building of a much-needed play shed. The school board was authorized to purchase a small strip of ground north of the present property.

Hayesville—A larger crowd than usual attended the annual school meeting of Hayesville district No. 99. Marc Saucy had charge of the meeting due to the absence of Charles Andreen. William Powers was re-elected clerk for one year and Charles Olson was placed as director on the school board, taking the place of Andreen who was not a candidate for re-election. The personnel of the board will consist of Saucy, chairman, H. Robertson and Charles Olson for the next year.

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Albany School Finances Are In Good Shape

Albany—Financial conditions of Albany school district No. 5 made gratifying improvement, it was reported yesterday by Dan Brenne-man, district school clerk, who made his annual report for the fiscal year, ending June 20.

The district's bonded indebtedness was decreased by \$10,000 to a present total of \$187,000, and short time loans totaling \$43,500 have been repaid entirely excepting \$4000 now outstanding, but which will be wiped out entirely as soon as a few tax payments are made.

The report revealed also that tax collections during the year exceeded by more than \$4,000 the amount levied, leaving no necessity of issuing unpaid warrants, and indicating that the new year will also bring a good report. Tax receipts totaled \$105,143.78.

The district started the year with a balance of \$1,672.84 and finished with \$3,763.08.

According to the report receipts totaled \$198,711.87, including \$43,500 short time loans, and expenditures were \$194,948 including the repayment of loans.

"Dark Horse" Stabbed
Albany—O. P. Romaine was elected and V. L. Calavan was re-elected to membership on the board of directors of Albany school district No. 5, at yesterday's annual school election, at which "dark horse" rumors that were circulated during the day failed to materialize. The board met immediately after the vote to reorganize. D. E. Nebergall was elected chairman. The board discussed the selection of a new athletic director for Albany high school but deferred action until July 5 or later.

Albany—E. B. Williamson, vice-president of the Bank of Albany since its organization, was elected president Monday by the board of directors, succeeding his father, the late T. B. Williamson, who died in March. M. D. McPherson was elected vice-president, C. E. Williamson re-elected cashier and Stanley Peterson, assistant cashier. The bank is owned by local stockholders and reported in a substantial condition.

Council Defers Sidewalk Action
Dallas—Bids were opened at the regular meeting of the city council Monday night for the proposed program of sidewalk improvement in the city. Four bids were received for materials and one for the complete project. Final action was deferred until next Monday evening when the council will hold a special meeting.

Jack Allgood, chairman of the city park board, announced that the pool in the park had been opened Monday and that it had been exceptionally well patronized during the day. Routine matters occupied the balance of the session.
