Lone Veteran Of Civil War Heading East

Woodburn—Wesley Loney, Woodburn's only surviving Civil war veteran, who will be 100 years old on November 22 of this year, left Saturday night to attend the reunion of Civil war veterans at Gettysburg. He was accompanied by his stepdaughter, Mrs. Clarence Gulliford. Although near the century mark, Loney is active both mentally and physically and entertained the crowd at the depot while waiting for the train with interesting stories of the war.

Loney was born November 22, 1838, in Tippecanoe county, Indiana, and spent his boyhood on a farm in that state. At the age of 25 he enlisted in Company I, 11th Cavalry, in the Army of the Cumberland and served under Generals Hatch and Wilson and in Thomas' campaign against Hood. He was in the battles of Franklin, Spring Hill and Nashville. He finished his service in Kansas protecting whites against the Indians.

Mr. Loney has been married three times, losing all of his wives by death. He has no children of his own and makes his home with his stepdaughter, Mrs. Gulliford. He has made his home in Marion county for more than 40 years and has lived in Woodburn 28 years. He has lived an active life and at the age of 89 built a residence on Clatsop street himself, where he lived until the death of this third wife. He has a keen memory and is well posted in civic and national affairs and enjoys life to the full.

Sewage Disposal Vote And School on Lists

Silverton—The Silverton school board will be asked to prepare the bond issue and to call a special election and all city voters will have a say at a special election concerning a new sewage disposal plant, if the desires of the members of the Silverton city planning council are carried out.

John W. Cunningham of Barr and Cunningham, Portland, was present in the interest of the sewage disposal plant. From Cunningham's estimates, the city council will be asked by the planning to bring a vote before the people asking for a \$53,000 system of which only \$39,000 will be assumed by the city and the remainder by a government loan.

Cunningham is familiar with the situation here as his company completed a survey several months' previous to the Friday night's meeting. Dr. P. A. Loe introduced the speaker by stressing the condition of the present system as being inadequate as to sanitation.

The matter of a new high school held the center of the stage in the discussions. T. T. Leonard presided. Plans for a new high school building were drawn and presented to the members of the Planning Council by F. M. Stokes, Portland architect. Leonard reported that his committee working on the project had made several discoveries, essentially that the last proposal voted on by the district, a rebuilding of the present high school plant costing \$81,000, with an additional \$9,000 added for the acquisition of the Gottenberg and Dolan properties, and this could not possibly include a place for physical education.

Physical education, stated Mr. Leonard, can no longer be side-tracked. The state requires it for the pupils and we have to have it. Separate lands would have to be purchased and a complete building would have to be constructed to meet the needs. This would add another cost of approximately \$15,000, making a grand total of \$125,000 with equipment.
