Other events scheduled on the rodeo program include a western parade, 49 dances, a carnival, pioneers' convention and a colorful queen's ball.

A queen and three princesses are to be elected from a field of 15 candidates to rule over the rodeo, on Thursday evening, June 30. The four girls will officially represent the St. Paul rodeo at the Pendleton Roundup in September.
