

Albany Park Transfer Made To Courthouse

Albany—Albany's city council transferred Takenah park to the county officially at its meeting here Wednesday. Takenah park is located in block 29 adjacent to the present site of the courthouse. The council also voted that the city would vacate Broadbent street between Fourth and Fifth streets.

The transfer was made conditional upon an agreement by the court that the county shall use whatever part of the property may be necessary as the site of a court house, and maintain the remainder for use of the public.

Speaking for the county court today, Judge J. J. Barrett said that the new courthouse will occupy only 35 per cent of the total area of the park block and of the present courthouse block and that it is the intention of the court to devote the remaining 65 per cent of each block to park purposes. It has been practically determined that the courthouse shall be located in the center of the two blocks, facing north.

Acceptance of the \$163,800 PWA grant offered to the county will be sent to the Public Works Administration immediately, Judge Barrett said. Work upon the project will be started within the next two months, it was stated, construction to start not later than September 1.
