Extirminating Rodents

Lebanon—Three delegates, T. G. Cowgill, A. B. Plummer and Webster Doughton, representing the Santiam rodent extermination committee recently elected at a meeting of farmers at Waterloo, went to Albany and Corvallis the first of the week to make further plans for a WPA project in this district. They contacted J. P. Merrill, resident engineer for WPA, at Corvallis; William A. Schoenfeld, director of the school of agriculture at OSC, and County Agent Mullin, where they received encouragement but little information since this is the first project of its kind to be attempted in Oregon.

Tentative plans which will have to be approved if the project is to be undertaken, include an estimate of the number of men required, which will probably be approximately 20, the establishment of a definite area, now estimated at 15 sections and the source of poison and source of traps, both of which would be used for extermination. As soon as these plans are compiled they will be submitted to the WPA headquarters for approval for its eligibility for WPA funds.

Tax Payments In Linn Show High Percent

Albany—Nearly two-thirds of the 1938 Linn county tax has been paid and reduced to 10.4 per cent, it was stated in the semi-annual report of Amy Ross, deputy sheriff, in charge of tax collections.

Of the total tax warrant of \$508,197.55 for this year, Miss Ross' report shows that \$550,256.01, including interest, has been paid, after deduction of \$13,532.10.

In addition to the current tax, the sheriff's office has received a total of \$106,023.83 in delinquent taxes, bringing total collections to \$656,322.79 with the forest patrol assessment of \$234,295 added.

But \$344,547.70 of the current roll remains uncollected, and on the 1937 roll only \$90,796.40 is uncollected.

PWA Project Proposed

Albany—Decision was reached to petition the PWA for a 45 per cent grant to be used in construction of the proposed new city garage and extension of the city's ornamental lighting system after the mayor and members of the city council had consulted officials at the office of Oregon PWA administrator C. C. Hockley. The amount of the combined projects has been tentatively fixed at \$20,000, approximately, of which the city's share would be \$11,000 and the PWA grant about \$9,000.
