Postal Fund Increases

Albany—Standing out in contrast with many other Oregon postoffices, the Albany office showed a gain of \$487.78 in stamp window business for the second quarter of this year.

Postmaster G. T. Hockenmuth reported yesterday, in comparison with the second quarter of last year.

The postmaster showed a report giving \$12,166.43 as the volume of business for June, May and April, while the total for the first quarter of last year, which was an all-time record high, was but \$11,678.53. The gain over last year's figures is 4.2 per cent.

June's sales topped those for May by nearly \$40, despite the occurrence of the primary election in May. The quarter's totals brought those for the first half of the year to \$24,495.16, which is \$628.55 in excess of last year's banner total.

Major Offenses Few

Albany—Although June brought a total of 285 arrests in Albany, the number of major offenses known to have been committed here was somewhat lower than average, according to the monthly report of Chief of Police Perry Stelmacher.

Of the arrests, 236 were for traffic law violations, the report showed. 44 of them on the first two days of the month, when the new city parking regulation went into effect.

Of the remaining arrests the next largest number of arrests was made for drunkenness. That number totaled 14, the report revealed.

Alleged Larcenist Jailed

Albany—William F. Grayson, Tucuman, N. Mex. was sentenced to serve 12 days in the county jail when he failed to pay a \$25 fine assessed to him in justice court yesterday, after he had pleaded guilty to a larceny charge.

Arrested by city police on a charge of stealing milk, in Grayson's knapsack were other articles which police alleged were stolen in Albany.

Lone Pension Check Issued

Independence—Mrs. Esther Morgan, who has never sought fame other than that of a true mother of her family, comes into the limelight because of receiving a small pension from the United States government as daughter of a veteran of the War of 1812, and because of the death of the other one of two surviving pensioners of that great war, who passed away Wednesday at Buffalo, New York, Mrs. Carolyn Poulter King, 89, who received a pension almost all her life. She was a veteran's widow, having married at the age of 18 Darius King, 71, a New York militiaman.

Mrs. Morgan now stands alone as the sole surviving pensioner in the entire United States of the War of 1812. Her pension is modest and she has her own home here with her son, M. Verde Morgan, who is an electrician.

She has moderately good health, and although almost blind for many years, she does her own housework, frequently visits the members of her family in other parts of Oregon. Recently she made a trip to Mt. Hood Inn, and enjoyed the sights on the way. She also made the journey to Bonneville dam on another occasion, and was interested in the entire development of that project. She has visited eastern and southern Oregon at various times. She enjoys her family and neighbors, has a good garden, and a host of friends.

Valley Cities Pledge Flax Festival Help

Mt. Angel—At the regular meeting of the Mt. Angel Business Men's club in the Creamery hall, when 75 members attended, plans were discussed for this year's Flax Festival which will be held here August 12 to 14.

Sam Siocum, who is managing this year's festival, announced that the chambers of commerce of the Willamette valley cities had been contacted and have pledged their support, realizing that Mt. Angel is promoting a new industry for the northwest. He has found that many want to see the flax machinery in operation, and that newspaper men are very much interested in developments here.

An added reward to the young lady fortunate enough to be selected for queen of the Flax Festival this year is the choice between a trip to the World's Fair at San Francisco and a journey to Alaska. All expenses for either trip selected by the queen will be paid. There are two candidates from Mt. Angel and one from each of several neighboring cities.

Four large banners and many smaller ones have been ordered for display on the streets and in local business places, according to information given by T. B. Endres of the Flax Festival committee. The WPA players will again present a play during the celebration and about 5000 attractive programs are to be issued for the affair. Mayor Carson of Portland has approved the request for an appropriation for a float in the Mt. Angel parade, which is the first official appropriation of this type ever made in the city of roses.
