Council Gives Lebanon Code For Sanitation

Lebanon—Following the recommendations advanced by Dr. N. E. Irvine, city health officer, the city council Tuesday night ordered City Attorney F. D. Mayer to draw up a new sanitary ordinance which will be acted upon in the next council meeting.

The ordinance, if adopted, will ban open privies and toilets within 300 feet of water mains, supplementing an existing ordinance which provides connections where sewers are within 100 feet of the property. The new ordinance, however, would affect all within 300 feet of mains irrespective of the distance from sewers.

The new proposed regulation is designed to remedy a present condition which the health officer classes as a menace to health.

City Engineer Stanley Stewart reported he had estimated costs upon five of the six sections of paved streets for repair of which the city will make application for a WPA labor project.

The total labor expense of the five was estimated at \$1316. The five sections are on Sherman for one-half block east of Main, Sherman west of Main, Main north of Standard station, Grant east of Main and Grant west of Main. The sixth portion is by the Keilensberger home at Grant and Second. Stewart will make estimates of costs there, following which the application will be filed.

The program of sprinkling streets with the power mill liquid has been so successful that Albany, Brownsville and Sweet Home have contacted city officials toward securing some of the liquor for their own streets. It was declared. The council, while indicating its co-operation, took no action.

Small rock will be mixed with the liquor on Academy between Main and Second in tests to see if rock and liquor will not bind better, the council decided. The maintainer will aid the experiment.

Street Superintendent E. E. Regester was granted his request for a two weeks' vacation with pay.

Tax Dollar Course Traced By Breakdown

Albany—For the first time in many years, if not in history, Linn county taxpayers may each know just where his county tax dollar goes. It was revealed by statistics released by the county clerk to satisfy his curiosity and that of a number of other taxpayers who had inquired.

Russell broke down the tax funds levied only for county purposes, including the state and county general taxes, market roads, road districts and common school funds, which for this year totaled 18 mills or \$394,312.33.

The figures do not include special levies for cities, schools and similar purposes.

It was found that 26.11 per cent of the 18-mill levy was used for county general purposes; 29.44 for schools and 44.42 per cent was devoted to roads.

The state elementary school tax was 12.22 per cent of the total and the county common school tax was 17.22 per cent.

Cost of operating county office, 6.11 per cent; relief of extended, 12.24 per cent; courts, 2.13 per cent; elections 1.65 per cent; courthouse maintenance, .64 per cent; jail, .63 per cent and miscellaneous items, .231 per cent.

The relief total of 12.24 per cent, Russell pointed out, of the county general expenditures, was formerly a negligible amount, but has been steadily rising for the past several years and is still doing so.

Red Cross Head Quarters
Albany—Mrs. Stanley Peterson submitted her resignation as executive secretary of the Linn county Red Cross chapter at the board's monthly meeting, despite protests of the board and its request that she reconsider. She has held that office for the past two years.

The board named Walter Arbuthnot, Mrs. J. J. Ransom, and Rev. A. R. Metcalf, Tangent, as a committee to carry on the executive work until a successor to Mrs. Peterson is named and also to investigate the qualifications for applicants for the position.

Albany—Merchandise amounting to \$50 was stolen Tuesday night from Hood's Grocery store on Lyon street, city police reported. The burglars entered by taking out a rear window, it was reported, but left on tangible clues. Hood's store was similarly robbed on March 23, 1936.

Willamina People Injured in Mishap
Willamina—Lometa Cooper of Willamina suffered severe injuries in an automobile wreck late Saturday night on the Wapinitia cut-off near Maupin. She and Floyd Glass, also of Willamina, who suffered minor lacerations and bruises, were enroute to Maupin to visit his cousin, Earl Cunningham, and family.

Floyd Glass's car was completely demolished as it left the highway and turned over, then rolled about 200 yards down a rocky incline. Lometa Cooper was taken to a McMinnville hospital where X-rays showed a fractured pelvis, a broken shoulder blade and a hip broken in three places. Lometa is reported in a critical condition. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. Maudlin of Willamina.

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
