

Linn Records In Good Shape Reports Show

Albany—Linn county's books and accounts were kept in excellent order during the first half of the year, but the sheriff's office is growing daily more handicapped by increase of business volume, it was reported by the auditor, employed by the county court.

The auditor found that the county ended the six months with a gross balance of \$447,741, including \$258,550 in the courthouse fund and \$209,191 in all other funds, after spending \$578,159 in cash and warrants for operating costs.

Total income was found to be \$568,632.75 from taxes, which with a \$371,605.25 balance carried over from the first of the year placed a total of \$1,030,238.04 to the credit of the treasury.

Spare Cash Available

Albany—Albany has enough money in its treasury to finance the proposed \$21,000 PWA street lighting and municipal barn projects and some to spare, it was revealed yesterday in the city recorder's semi-annual report.

The recorder's books show a balance of \$67,280.19 at the end of June, with more than half the year's budgeted expenditures already made and with more than a third of the city's special levies yet to be paid into the treasury.

The report shows that the city received during the first half of the year a total income of \$773,662.33.

The city has a net debt of \$48,162.55, the lowest in many years.

The city's net debt at the end of last year was \$76,385.19, showing a reduction of \$28,222.64 during the last six months.

Judge Gives Parole

Albany—J. H. Rogers of Elmira was sentenced to a year in the penitentiary by Judge L. H. McMahan in circuit court here yesterday but was paroled to his attorney, J. K. King, Eugene, on condition he repay his victims at the rate of \$10 a month. Rogers had cashed a \$103.43 check made out to another person with same name at a local grocery store in February, 1936.

Dead Horse Costly

Albany—J. H. Robinson, Junction City, was released under \$100 bail to appear in justice court here next Wednesday to answer to a charge of leaving the carcass of a horse without burying it. Robinson is accused of shooting a horse that had suffered a broken leg, enroute to the Crawfordville round-up, and of leaving the body lying at the roadside a mile east of Brownsville.

Santiam Spree Queen Race On

Stanton—With all committee members pounding away at their respective assignments, everything is expected to be in readiness for the opening of the Santiam Spree in a fortnight.

The race for the honor of queen of the spree, which has been going on for the past month, is developing into a heated contest with the out-of-town contestants reporting for the first time, since the initial week.

Margaret Kimbrough continues to head the pack but is closely followed by Helen Hughes. The Scio and Lebanon candidates reported sufficient votes this week to keep them in the running with the leaders and word from those towns indicate the contestants are holding back many votes for the final report.

Members of the Stanton band, under the direction of J. F. Lau, will play several numbers and Kentin Thompson will play a medley of popular numbers as a piano solo.

The parade committees headed by Grant Murphy and Ward Ingalls report many entries in both the industrial march and the pet parade. The industrial parade slated for Friday morning will be followed the next day by the pet parade, with many of the industrial floats in the march.

Dallas Model Home Opened For Inspection

Dallas—The model home, which has been built entirely of local lumber for Mrs. William Swindells at the corner of Jefferson and Clay streets, will be open for all who wish to inspect it Saturday. It will be open also between the hours of 3 and 5 o'clock for several days following that date.

The attractive five-room structure shows the use of the latest achievements in lighting, ventilation and finish. The house has been furnished throughout for display by the following firms: Crider's Dept. store, Adolf's Electric shop, Priesen's Furniture store and Sterling Furniture company.

Upon making a south front entrance one's attention is drawn to the random width wall panels finished in white lead and oil in the living room, dining room and halls. The living room has a beam ceiling with an attractive fireplace the front of which is broken tile. All the floors with the exception of kitchen and bath, have a black walnut finish.

The bedrooms, both of which have casement windows, have craftwood wall finishes and are complete with spacious wardrobes.

A large window extends across the living room and opens to the front of the house which is shaded by several fruit trees and other shrubs. The large center panel is stationary while the two side sections swing outward. Similar smaller windows are used in the other rooms.

The kitchen is compactly arranged for the utmost in modern cooking efficiency with numerous built-in cupboards and drawers. Its smart appearance is further enhanced by a tile drainboard of ivory with border bands of raspberry and black.

The basement is equipped with a furnace with sawdust burner and air-conditioner, convenient sawdust bin and stationary wash tubs. The basement is above sewer level which prevents the possibility of damage caused by the entry of moisture.

A single garage with a full width door which springs up and over the automobile, while open has been erected at the rear of the house.

The house is for sale. The success of its disposal will determine whether or not Mrs. Swindells will build similar homes for sale. The house was designed by Howard Riley of Seattle, Wn., and construction was by Oscar and Forrest Holmes, local contractors.

Weddle Sealed Stayton Mayor Early in Term

Stayton—George A. Smith, Stayton mayor and member of the city council for the past 20 years, resigned public office this week, as was indicated last month, and was succeeded by Mayor-elect W. A. Weddle. Weddle, by confirmation of the city council, starts his office immediately, six months ahead of schedule due to the resignation.

Press of business at this time was given by Mayor Smith as the reason for his resignation.

Heavy expenditures during the past few months, mainly for water main construction, placed the city finances this week on a warrant basis, for the first time in several years. More than \$2,000 in warrants are outstanding and additional warrants are to be issued for the payment of the June accounts.

According to present indications the warrant basis will be continued until late in the fall but that the amount and number of outstanding warrants will be reduced materially before that time. The town treasurer is expecting daily a turnover of the county tax monies for the last quarter, which will be used to take up some of the warrants.

George Duncan, city recorder, reported today.

"There will be money coming to the city practically every month," Duncan said. "These funds will be used to retire the warrants as rapidly as possible."

The town was forced on the warrant basis by the expenditure of several thousand dollars for the installation of new water mains, the cost exceeding the original expectations. In addition the payment by the city of several hundred dollars for the purchase of a new fire truck, in conjunction with the fire department, reduced the city funds.

With the water main project completed, the WPA forces here concentrated on the construction of sidewalks. Requests have been filed for the construction of sufficient sidewalks to maintain a force here for several months.

The proposition of oiling the street, leading to the city park, was discussed by the council without definite action. It was indicated that if the street is to be oiled the cost must be defrayed by individual property owners.

Candidates' List Initiation Gains

Lebanon Has Stamp Gains

Lebanon—Receipts in stamps and stamp stock at the Lebanon post-office for the first six months of 1938 were five percent greater than in the same period last year, according to an announcement made yesterday by Postmaster Merrill Smith.

The figures were hailed as especially significant in the face of the fact that receipts in other Oregon postoffices had materially decreased this year.

Observers pointed out that if the same pace is continued, the gross for all of 1938 will again set a new record.

In the first six months this year, the receipts were \$8192, compared to \$7859 for the same period the year before. This is a gain of \$333.

Smith also announced that sales in the fiscal year just closed were five per cent higher than in the previous fiscal year. The gross from July, '37, to June, '38 were \$17,395; the year before they were \$16,587, or an increase of \$807.

Lebanon—Almost 600 persons turned out at Newport field to hear the first of a series of free summer municipal band concerts. That this

initial program was enjoyed was apparent in the hearty applause of those seated on the grandstands and fields and in the sounding of the horns of the several score of cars. Wayne Giltry, school instrumental supervisor, conducted the band of about 50 members, some of whom were adults. The program consisted of marches and of several selections of more popular music. The next concert is scheduled Friday evening, July 15. They begin at 7:45 p. m.
