Jimmy Foulis, who upset Jimmy Thomson in the second round, has the finest golfing background of any man in the tournament. . . . His father and his father's father were born in a masher pitch of the old St. Andrews course in Scotland, and he can trace his love for golf clear back to a Foulis who tended the fairways of St. Andrews at the time of Cromwell. . . . Dave Foulis, Jimmy's papa, invented the club we know as the masher niblick and patented the first lining for a golf cup. . . . And Jim's uncle Jim won the second National open in the year 1890. . . .

Marvin Stahl, Lansing, Mich., boy who has been a sensation in the tournament, fulfilled a wish of long standing yesterday. He was introduced to Gene Sarazen. . . . Hines and Shute Even Up in PGA Match Test

Nelson 12 Up On California Pro Aspirant

Shawnee-on-Delaware, Pa., July 13 (AP)—Denny Shute of West Newton, Mass., winner of the past two titles, was all-square with Jimmy Hines of New York at the end of the morning round of their 36 hole battle in the third round of the P. G. A. golf tournament today. Byron Nelson of Reading, Pa., medalist last year, turned in a sensational round of 64, eight under par, to be 12 up at the end of the round over Harry Bassler of Long Beach, Calif. Nelson's round was two strokes under the competitive course record.

Shawnee-on-Delaware, Pa., July 13 (AP)—They threw Jimmy Hines at defending champion Denny Shute, winner of 14 straight P. G. A. matches, in today's 36 hole round of the pros' own national championship. But Jimmy wouldn't concede that they were throwing him to the lions, or even one lion. "Somebody's got to beat Denny some day," said the big blonde from Great Neck, N. Y., who dropped a 4 and 3 decision to Shute in the 1937 quarter-finals, "and there's no reason why it shouldn't be me. The mere fact that he's won those 14 matches certainly isn't going to scare me any—and I know that Denny's already beginning to worry about when his streak will end."

Shute afraid? "He admitted as much last night, after he'd breezed through two rounds and I'd poked out Frank Walsh. 'I'd a lot sooner have seen Frank win' is what he said, and that's because he knows he's going to have a match on his hands."

For that matter, each of the 18 survivors on today's program had the same thing—"a match on his hands." Going right down the line, there were Byron Nelson against Harry Bassler, a Californian who's a consistent campaigner in his own territory; prize discovery from Lansing, Mich., against Jim Foulis, who knocked off Gene Sarazen a year ago; Sam Snead against Felix Serrano, surprise conqueror of Harry Cooper and Kay Laffoon yesterday; Billy Burke and Horton Smith, Ray Mangrum and ex-Champ Paul Runyan, Sarazen and square-shouldered Jimmy Demaree, and Henry Picard and Dick Metz, who put out open champion Ralph Guidahl in the second round.

Angels Pare Solons' Lead

San Francisco, July 13 (AP)—A sensational catch and a 13th inning two-bagger, both by a weather-beaten veteran, were the reasons Sacramento's Solons had only a two-game lead in the Pacific coast baseball league today.

The score was tied at 4-all last night when Arnold Stutz, second place Los Angeles centerfielder who has been playing baseball for some 20 years in big and little leagues, came to bat in the first of the 13th. Dutch Lieber had singled before him. Stutz smashed a two-bagger and Lieber came home with the run that gave the Angels a 5 to 4 win over the Senators.

In their half of the 13th, the Senators got Johnny Verges on base. Centerfielder Ray Diefenbach cracked a scorcher into centerfield with three bases written on the cover. Again Stutz came to the rescue and snared the seemingly sure hit on the dead run and the game was over.

Paced by Freddie Muller and Levi McCormack, who smacked four hits each in five times at bat, Seattle overcame an early lead to defeat the Hollywood Stars, 5 to 3. Seattle's win put the Indians into a tie for third place with the San Diego Padres, who shoved the San Francisco Seals out of the first division by beating them 6 to 2.

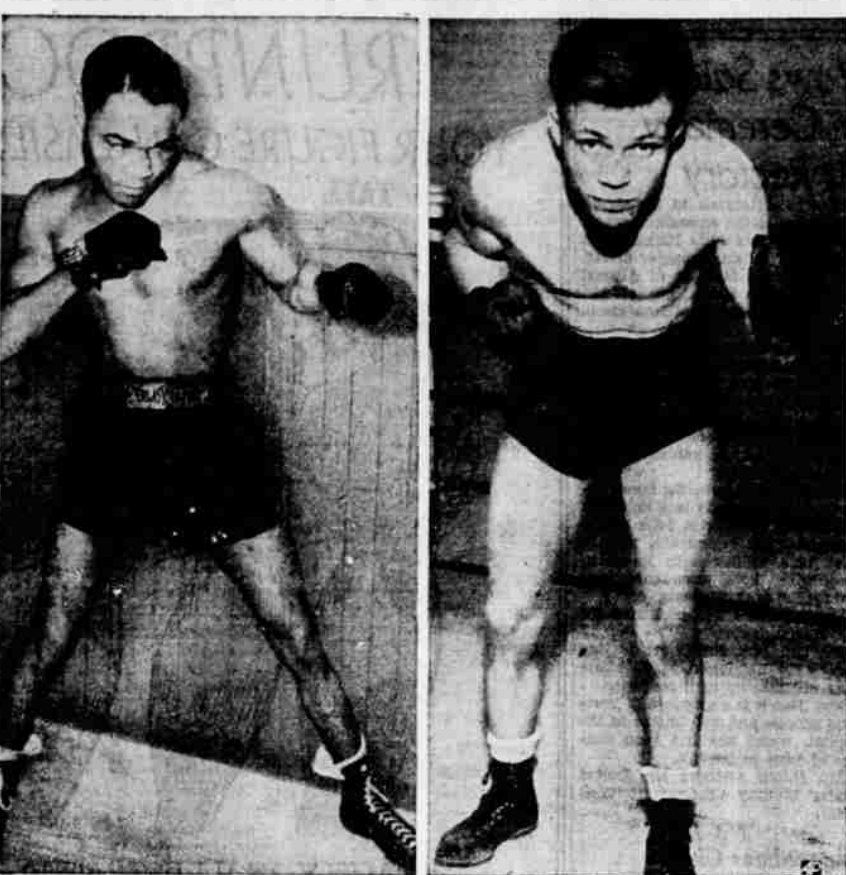

"We signed Buster McMillan, the ex-Commerce high catcher, and he is so young and such a good prospect that Sweeney won't farm him for fear he might be overworked and ruined. We keep him to warm up pitchers between innings. I want Sweeney to give the kid a chance to play now whenever we find a spot for it."

President Scheffer observed the opening night games and said he would be back later to see more.

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Pirates Back On Top After 13th Straight

Back home in first place! That has a comfortable sound for any ball club, especially one which hasn't had a taste of World Series glory for more than a decade.

That's just the position of the Pittsburgh Pirates today. They finished up their road chores in Chicago yesterday by pounding out a 14 to 6 victory over the hapless Cubs. It was their 13th straight win—the longest streak since 1922 when they also won 13—and it put them in the lead by a hair's breadth or two. Today they return home to face the national league's eastern clubs, starting with the Brooklyn Dodgers, who knocked their hated rivals, the New York Giants, out of the lead yesterday by beating them 15-5.

Bees Lead Percentage
By one way of counting, the Giants have a half-game bulge, but since they have played more games, their percentage is lower, .635 to Pittsburgh's .638. And that's what they pay off on.

The American league came close to having a shift in leadership as well, for the Cleveland Indians took a 9-6 setback at Washington in the first game of their eastern tour while the fast-stepping New York Yankees knocked off the St. Louis Browns twice, 7-3 and 10-5. The tribe managed to hold the top by a half-game margin, but the Yanks and their backers figure it's just a matter of time before they cut that clinch.

The Cincinnati Reds beat out St. Louis 6-5 in the other national league game and dropped the Cards to seventh.

The remaining major league contest saw the Chicago White Sox, scoring five runs on homers by Mike Kreevic and Joe Kuhel, to hand the Athletics their eighth straight defeat, 9-6. Detroit and the Boston Red Sox were rained out while the Phillies and Boston Bees had an open date.

Get 17 Hits
Al Todd and Paul Waner paced the 17-hit Pirate attack that gave the Cubs their sixth straight setback. Todd drove in five runs with a homer, double and single, while Waner made four singles.

Lou Gehrig and Joe DiMaggio contributed homers, the 14th for each, to the Yankee twin win, and Red Ruffing batted in three runs with a pair of doubles in the opener to help win his 12th game.

David, a muscular six-footer weighing 185 pounds, is a 20 year old Purdue university student. He displayed rare ability to recover from trouble yesterday when he covered the tricky Chain o' Lakes course in 69, two under par.

Hoffer's farmers started the scoring and held a three-point lead over Lucht's nine at the end of the sixth, but in the seventh the Meridian farmers closed the gap and tied the score, and chalked up a one-point lead in the eighth for the championship.
