

Chair Factory Reduces Hours Of Employment

Albany—Starting this week the R. Vecken and Son chair factory inaugurated the 40-hour week. L. L. Swan, manager, announced Tuesday. Under this schedule the workers each work eight hours daily for five days each week. The old schedule of 44 1/2 hours a week was last week reduced to a 7-hour day of five days weekly, or 35 hours a week. Swan hopes to continue operations on the present schedule indefinitely.
