Albany Finds Heat Records All Smashed

Albany—Albany's 1938 heat record was broken and its all-time record seriously menaced at 2 o'clock yesterday when the official U. S. weather bureau thermometer mounted to 102 degrees.

Yesterday's mark climaxed a series of hot days for more than a week, with the mercury not dropping below the 90 mark. No reports of Linn county fires, however, had been received late yesterday.

The thermometer registered 95 at noon yesterday and climbed seven degrees in the next two hours. Business houses reported adverse effects of hot weather upon trade growing more noticeable and farmers have virtually abandoned hope of a spring grain harvest.

Relief Figures Unchanged

Albany—Because of a change in the schedule for approvals of old age assistance applications the number to receive such relief and the amount to be paid July 31 will differ but slightly from the June 30 figures. Alvis Love, county relief administrator, said yesterday. In consequence the number of old age assistance applicants to receive this form of relief July 31 will number 458 and the amount to be paid them will be \$8870.75, only \$36 less than last month.
