Stayton Model Home Product Local Supplies

Stayton—Residents of this territory are to be guests Sunday at the formal opening of the model home, constructed on Washington street near First street by Grant Murphy of the Murphy-Gardner Lumber company. The completed house, including insurance and fixtures, shows an expenditure of \$3653.51.

The house was constructed as a demonstration to prove that the cost of lumber and mill work were not the major items in the cost of building a house, Murphy said. The cost sheets for the model home show that the lumber expenditures total \$719.45 and the mill work \$322.48, or less than 30 percent of the total construction price.

All of the materials for the house were purchased in Stayton and all of the labor employed in Stayton. The house is a five-room cottage with a 36.5 by 36 foot measurement over all. The one floor arrangement affords an entrance into a living room approximately 18 by 14 feet, enhanced by a well constructed fireplace and flanked by specially designed windows.

A 10 by 13 foot dining room adjoins the living room and affords entrance into a kitchen 7 by 13 feet which is equipped with drop-leaf and built-in tables and cupboards. Entrance to the front bedroom, 13 by 12 feet, is gained from a small hall connecting the two bedrooms and bath and opening into both the living room and kitchen. Stairs leading to a full basement adjoin the kitchen and back entryway. The stairs go up from the hall to a large attic.

The first floor has 8550 cubic feet of space while the basement has 6930 and the attic 5110 feet.

According to the completed cost sheets as reported today by Grant Murphy, and Oscar Hagen, contractor, the following expenditures completed the construction of the home: Insurance \$30; title insurance \$16; plans and specifications \$15; foundation and basement \$322.18; septic tank and cesspool \$45.93; lumber \$719.45; outside painting \$113.52; inside painting \$217.75; carpenter and other labor \$597.75; hardware \$109.20; plumbing \$269.08; fireplace and chimney \$149.01; plastering \$152.90; sheet metal \$63.50; mill work \$322.48; tile work \$44.55; terrace and steps \$28.85; floor finishing \$39.68; linoleum \$41.68; light fixtures \$59.98; electric wiring \$134.45; heating plant \$145; window shades 28.57. Grand total \$3653.51.

Albany—That Albany's two-hour parking zone system is working out well and that accordingly extension of the zone to include possibly the entire business district may be requested is indicated by a petition which was presented to the city council Wednesday asking the inclusion of one more block within the zone.

The petition, signed by 11 property owners and tenants of property on both sides of Second street, between Lyon and Baker streets, was granted by the council and accordingly the two-hour parking law is in force along that block as well as in the original zone.

The petitioners complained that their property and places of business are being obstructed now by cars belonging to occupants of the parking zone area, causing great inconvenience.
