

Modern Trends Held Alarming By Bank Head

Albany—Modern trends, of which some he declared alarming, were discussed before the Albany Rotary club Friday by Clyde Williamson, cashier of the Bank of Albany and retiring president of the Oregon State Bankers' association, who above all decried the trend toward individual dependence.

"During the hard times of 1893," the speaker said, "almost everyone thought that it was his job to make a living and support his family and, if he didn't it was his own fault. That philosophy has gone into the discard."

"Social security, pensions, unemployment insurance and the government owes me a living idea have taken its place."

Another trend which Mr. Williamson emphasized was the private debt trend.

"Debt hangs as a heavy millstone around too many necks and robs the individual and family of many happy moments," he said. "A pay-as-you-go plan is still sound business."

In regard to the trend toward loose financial thinking the speaker remarked that it is easier to finance an automobile loan than a home loan for money lenders have learned that the borrower is more certain to pay off the loan if his car is security than if it is his home.

The hope for the future lies, Mr. Williamson said, in the youth of this nation, and that is why, he explained, that the bankers of today are interesting themselves particularly in 4-H club work.

The 4-H club boy and girl is being given the implements of self-determination insofar as it is humanly possible, Mr. Williamson said.
