Pittsburg, Aug. 1 (AP)—Byron (Whizzer) White, University of Colorado's all-American football player, will play professional football with the Pittsburgh Pirates this season before attending Oxford university on a Rhodes scholarship.

White accepted the \$15,000 contract offered him for the coming season early today in a telephone conversation with Arthur Rooney, president of the Pittsburgh Pirates, members of the National Professional Football league, Rooney announced.

Rooney, who selected White in the league draft at Chicago last December, said White would go to Oxford in January after completing the regular league schedule of 11 games and four or five exhibition games.

In particular, Pittsburgh's Pirates, National league leaders, seem to be jinxed by the Brooklyn Dodgers and the second-place New York Giants and the Cincinnati Reds. And now the humble Phillies are troubling Chicago's Cubs.

It wasn't any great surprise to the cash customers when the Dodgers knocked off the Pirates, 4-3, yesterday and the Reds out-lasted the Giants, 7-6, in an 11 inning struggle. Pittsburgh has won just half its 16 games against Brooklyn and the Giants have taken only one series and six games in 17 starts against Reds.

The Cubs dropped their third straight close one at Philadelphia, 6-5, when Bill Atwood belted a home run with two out in the 12th inning of a twin bill opener. They came back to win a seven inning nightcap, 4-3.

St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 1 (AP)—Johnny Revolta today owned a brand new check for \$1,800 and his third major fairway triumph of 1938.

The wavy-haired professional from Evanston, Ill., who began playing golf as a caddy 15 years ago in Wisconsin, placed another notch on his clubs yesterday by capturing the \$7500 St. Paul open championship at the Keller course from a fast field which gave par a thorough battering.

Revolta's final two rounds of 71-68 for a 72 hole aggregate of 276 or 12 under par, was one stroke under the total of big Willie Goggin of San Bruno, Calif., runner-up a year ago. In third place was "Slamin' Sam" Sneed of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., the defending champion, with a 278 total, followed by Ernie Harrison of Chicago at 279, Lawson Little of San Francisco at 280 and Frank Stuhler of Jamaica, N. Y., at 281.

Goggin won second money of \$1050, with Sneed pocketing \$800 to boost his leading season's money total to \$9412. Revolta's victory moved him from fourth place among the many winners for the year to second, with a \$6878 total.
