School Contract Awarded
Lebanon—Alfred Rucker of Lebanon was awarded the contract to build the new Griggs school. Rucker's bid was \$169,450, the lowest of eight submitted. Work will begin immediately and will be pushed as rapidly as possible so the structure will be ready for occupancy at the beginning of the fall term, September 19. A. I. Crandall of Lebanon is the architect.

Funds Granted School
Lebanon—Middle Ridge school, located on the hill about six miles south of Lebanon, was granted full appropriation of elementary and county school funds this week in response to a petition. These funds will assure the district of a school again this year. Although the enrollment is small and frequently falls below the average to maintain a district, it is necessary to maintain a school there because of its remoteness. Mt. Pleasant school near Lacombe, which was suspended last year, will not open this year and pupils will attend Happy Home, Salt Lake or Lebanon schools.

Youth Program Is Underway On Huge Scale

Silverton—Perhaps members of the local chapter of Norwegian Lutheran Brotherhood had no idea how far-reaching just a little concentrated effort could be in projects of improvement where the youth of the city was concerned when they appointed three of their members, Alf O. Nelson, H. N. Klev and H. B. Jorgensen, on a committee to look into these immediate needs in Silverton in connection with a nation-wide program of all Lutheran Brotherhood chapters in the United States.

Alf O. Nelson, chairman of the committee, and Mrs. Nelson started the move in a social way when several months ago the Brotherhood members and a few civic-minded citizens were asked to the Nelson home for refreshments and the launching of the ideas that the Brotherhood committee had pondered on for a year and a half.

Growing immediately out of the plans of that evening was the organization of the Silverton planning council, of which T. T. Leonard was made chairman and Celia Hannan, secretary.

In short, the vote on a new \$151,000 high school building passed a big majority vote with 14 acres for the building site donated; Dr. P. A. Loe's pet plans for the past eight years of building a sewage disposal plant met the approval of the city council in shifting the responsibility to the water commission; and the latest phase for youth betterment, a real sanitary swimming pool, perhaps in connection with the athletic program of the schools, is now underway of a general shove. All these moves forward for the home town grew out of the hopes of the Brotherhood, and from general talk, this isn't all.

Fierly thatched merry-makers began arriving in Taft Friday morning and a constantly growing horde of the "carrot tops" and other visitors continued to pour into the Redhead mecca throughout the day.

Each redhead who registers at the Roundup headquarters receives a beautiful agate souvenir. The youngest to be registered Friday was four-months old Billie Johnson of Corvallis, and the oldest, Mrs. Claire Feller of Donald, 64 years of age.

Opening at 12:30 p.m. with a massed band concert, the Roundup program for the initial day includes the coronation rites for beautiful Queen Jean Bateman of Toledo, who will reign over the titian celebration. The Salem Cherrians will be in charge of the crowning ceremony. Marvin Headrick, a member of the Council of Nobles of the Cherrians, is the King of the Roundup. He rules under the title of "Eric, the Red."

Following the coronation a wide variety of prize contests for redheads will be featured. Valuable rewards will go to the winners. The first western demonstration of the "Kiss Register," the new scientific machine for measuring the "kick" in a kiss, headlines the afternoon's entertainment.
