The first game of the tournament will be tonight on McGinnis field beginning at 7:30 o'clock with Idaho, home team, meeting Oregon, and Montana, home team, meeting Washington.

Sunday's games will include a tilt between first round losers at 1 o'clock, followed by the championship contest.

Salem and Portland representatives were out to the banquet in loyal support of the efforts being put forth by Delbert Reeves post No. 7, Silverton, in sponsoring the biggest sports event ever brought to the home town.

"When you get knocked down, get up," advises Spec Keene of Salem, national director and in general charge of the tourney. Keene also told the managers that all teams must report to their respective homes following the Silverton tournament.

Brant, member of the emergency conservation committee of New York, said a monopoly on duck hunting would be recreated by such practices, limiting the sport to a few wealthy men.

Ducks, he said, would be practically eliminated.

Hutch Hurls 19th Win on 19th Birthday

San Francisco, Aug. 13 (AP)—Freddie Hutchinson is getting to be a big, big boy in the Pacific Coast league.

The 200 pound youngster, who turned down a major league offer after graduating from Seattle's Franklin high school this year in favor of starting his professional baseball career with the hometown club, celebrated a record party last night.

It was his 19th birthday and 16,354 fans, the largest crowd in Seattle's baseball history, turned out to cheer him as he pitched his 19th victory of the season—a 3 to 2 win over San Francisco's Seals.

Hutchinson, a right hander, now ranks at the top of Coast league hurlers. Against his string of victories are only six defeats.

The triumph boosted Seattle to a tie with San Diego for third place in the league's standings and sank the Seals to fifth.

In brief then, the Nats have relied just about exclusively on their appleknocking ability to keep them in the first division, and unless some of the other collections masquerading as ball clubs in the American league soon get busy, they're going to find old Fox Clark Griffith and Boy-Wonder Harris winding up in the money again.

Of course the Nats don't figure to get any higher than their present fourth place this year. The Yankees' powerhouse is rolling now, as witness the six homers murderers' row sprayed among the paying customers yesterday in splitting a doubleheader with the Athletics. Del Mar, Calif., Aug. 13 (AP)—Seabiscuit took \$25,000 in a match race with Ligaroti at Bing Crosby's Turf club here yesterday, but it had a mystery angle. The stewards went into a stew to determine whether Seabiscuit won by a good horse's head or a bad jockey's leg.

Seabiscuit's new track record of 1:49 for a mile and an eighth went into the books, but the big five-year-old's victory by a head over Ligaroti was far from a closed chapter as stewards met to consider the suspensions they clapped on Jockeys George Woolf and Moel Richardson, without explanation, immediately after the match race.

The stewards were silent, promising an announcement after their session. So was Richardson, but Woolf spoke his piece as follows: "Richardson (who rode Ligaroti) claimed a foul had been committed to save his own skin. Richardson grabbed my whip hand when he headed into the stretch and then he hustled into the stewards' stand after the race to claim I fouled him."

Salem Yacht Club Races Due Sunday

Speed boat drivers from the northwest to the number of 35 or 40 will do their tricks and race for prizes over a mile course in the Willamette river Sunday afternoon. The occasion is the first annual Salem Yacht club regatta, conducted by the Oregon Outboard Racing association. Spectators will find the best vantage points along the Willamette just above Mellow Moon pavilion. There will be competition for class M hydroplanes, service runabouts, racing runabouts, racing hydroplanes, hydroplanes and for utility runabouts. A special feature will be a women's mid-gate race.

Time trials will be held at noon while actual racing is scheduled to get under way an hour later.
