Portland, Aug. 13 (AP)—The army air force has the finest personnel in the world, Major General Frank M. Andrews, commander of the general headquarters air force, said in an interview.

On the Pacific coast to observe maneuvers, the general said that besides top personnel, he thought the United States had "one of the best bombing planes in the world and all of our planes compare favorably with the others of the various nations."

The general said airplanes were being delivered faster than the air force could recruit personnel.

Americans Win 6 Out of 10 on Berlin Track

Berlin, Aug. 13 (AP)—Winning six firsts out of ten events, the United States took a lead of 58-49 over Germany at the end of the first day of their two-day track and field competition in Olympic stadium today.

The Americans won five of the six track events, yielding only the 800 meters in which Rudolf Harbig beat the invaders' combination of Charlie Beetham and Howie Borck. Germany took three of the four field events but the United States finished one, two in the pole vault as Cornelius Warmerdam of San Francisco cleared the bar at 13 feet 11 1/2 in., and George Varoff of Oregon at 13 ft. 7 in.

The meet ended with the American quartet of Wilbur Greer, Mosel Elberbe, Clyde Jeffrey and Ben Johnson clipping six-tenths of a second off the German record for the 400-meter relay. The team was clocked in 40.3 seconds flat, only three tenths of a second short of the world record.

A sudden downpour of rain before the meet opened made the track slow.

Nazi Airliner Off for Berlin

New York, Aug. 13 (AP)—Germany's giant airliner, "Brandenburg" took off from Floyd Bennett field at 8:02 1/2 a. m. (EST) today for its return flight to Berlin, the 13th trans-Atlantic flight of the summer.

Five hours later the coast guard here intercepted a wireless message from the plane giving her position as latitude 43-44 north and longitude 64-21 west. The coast guard said that was roughly 100 miles east northeast of Cape Sable, Nova Scotia.

Capt. Alfred Henke, the plane's commander, said before the take-off that the ship would fly just south of the great circle and that he hoped to land in Germany in about 20 hours.

There were about 1000 people at the airport. They applauded the take-off and watched the ship circle over the field four minutes later and head into the morning sun.

The weather was clear and bright but the fliers expected to encounter some rain over the Atlantic.

Bruno Hess, meteorologist, attached to the S. S. Friesenland, German catapult ship, said the Brandenburg would fly a route about 1000 kilometers longer than that taken on the Berlin-New York flight. The ship carried 2370 gallons of gasoline.

Portland, Aug. 13 (AP)—Sponsored by a community club group, a petition bearing 14,600 signatures, or about two-thirds of the number necessary, was presented to the city auditor, calling for an election in November on the question of a mandatory tax levy of four-tenths of a mill for parks and playgrounds. The community group insists the city has but half enough parks for its population. Other petitions are expected to be presented.

Body Found in River

Otto Haged, 35, a baker, was recovered from the Willamette river last night. He disappeared Wednesday and his clothing later was found beneath the Ross island bridge.

Gravel has been spread and oiled on the Smith street entrance to the state fair grounds east of the railroad track and along the implement building across to the Silverton highway entrance opposite the Marion county highway shops. The road had been closed to traffic this week to permit setting of the oil so that the road will be in the best possible condition when the fair opens September 5. The 15th street entrance, a popular fair Salem people, is also oiled and dust will be eliminated this year.

Damage Suit Filed In Death Accident

Dallas—Roy M. Wheeler, as administrator of the estate of Daryl Dean Wheeler, deceased, filed suit Wednesday for \$10,000 damages against Verne Vincent Wheeler of Monmouth. Daryl died July 28 from injuries sustained the previous evening when struck in Independence by Wheeler's car. He was five years old.

The complaint charges that Wheeler was driving his car in excess of 45 miles an hour in the city limits and that he did not have his car under immediate and satisfactory control at the time the boy started across the highway. Bruce Spaulding is attorney for the plaintiff.

American War Guns Captured

Hendaye, France, at the Spanish frontiers, Aug. 13 (AP)—Spanish insurgents announced today they had captured large quantities of American war materials from government armies.

An insurgent communique declared 17 tanks and 33 field guns of American manufacture had fallen into their hands since the start of the civil war. Listed also were 630 machine guns, 3430 rifles and 11,700 shells of American manufacture captured from the enemy.

Simultaneous with this announcement and the fighting of a continued battle around Cabera Del Buey in southwestern Spain for control of the Almaden mercury mines, insurgent military authorities tightened frontier control.

This action led to the belief a new offensive was about to be launched.

The announcement of the capture of American war materials apparently was designed to match government assertions that new German and Italian aid is reaching the insurgents.

The communique also listed 404 Russian tanks, 60,000,000 Russian cartridges, 405 French field guns, 410 French sub machine guns, 16,000,000 British cartridges and 11,000,000 cartridges supplied by Mexico as among war materials captured by insurgent troops.

Oakland Store Goes Back to Work

Oakland, Calif., Aug. 13 (AP)—A back-to-work trek of union employees of the Whithorne and Swan department store began today after James Galliano, attorney representing nine unions, announced "the controversy is settled."

The picket line of the retail clerks' union—largest labor organization affected—remained at the store, however, pending an answer from the Retail Merchants association regarding demands that a temporary agreement ending the strike eliminate all reference to a closed shop—the major issue in the controversy.

The strike began July 27. The store remained open, however.

A provision of the proposal which already has been accepted by nine unions, Galliano said, calls for the store to drop a damage action against union officials.

The agreement also calls for resumption of negotiations as soon as unions have returned to work.

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Waldport to Improve If Grant Allowed

The town of Waldport in Lincoln county, Oregon, has applied to the public works administration for a loan of \$13,750 and grant of \$11,250 for street improvements estimated to cost \$25,000. PWA Regional Director C. C. Hockley announced. The application was signed by Councilman E. F. Hosford of Waldport. Andrew Porter of Newport is engineer for the project.

Application for a grant of \$9,818 to reconstruct its waterworks system has been filed with the public works administration by the town of Seio in Linn county, Oregon. Estimated cost of the project is \$21,800. The application was signed by Councilman G. P. Bryan. Claude E. Ellison of Salem is engineer for the project.

Acting Mayor W. F. Ottman of Burns in Harney county, Oregon, has applied for a grant of \$2,932 for replacement of sewer line and construction of a children's playground. Total cost of construction is estimated at \$6,516. R. M. Lowe of Burns is resident engineer and Robert B. Gould is consulting engineer for these projects.

F. A. Shelton of Stanfield, president of the Stanfield Irrigation district in Umatilla county, Oregon, has applied for a grant of \$2,300 for construction of a headgate and flood control gate, estimated to cost \$5,110. F. B. Hayes of Stanfield is engineer for the project.

These applications will be sent to Washington for approval.

England Has Severe Storm

London, Aug. 13 (AP)—Overcast children threw snowballs in Yorkshire today. In Norfolk the snow was two feet deep, the result of two days of freak storms that cut a crazy path across England and caused three deaths and property damage estimated at \$7,500,000.

At World Newton a number of women were near hysteria because of the fury of lightning and thunder. Children fled screaming from an evangelist's tent when lightning struck the main pole and severely burned the preacher.

Thousands of telephone lines were out of commission and hundreds of houses struck by lightning. Laborers worked all last night to remove tons of debris from railroad tracks. Many villages were flooded. In northwest London hall-stones covered the ground to the depth of one inch.

Coffey and White Reach Fairbanks

Fairbanks, Alaska, Aug. 13 (AP)—Flying through thick weather all the way, H. K. Coffey and W. F. White, Jr., Portland, Ore., landed here in the rain last night from Nome after being turned back once and setting down at Candle, western Alaska.

Coffey said they started early yesterday and got as far as Unalakleet, before turning back to Candle. Their flight from Candle took five and a half hours.

The men reported flying south of here near Mt. McKinley, hoping to get pictures, but they were unsuccessful.

The two are returning home from a flight to Barrow in connection with a memorial for Wiley Post and Will Rogers.

They went walrus hunting at Barrow with the Oklahoma and Texas expedition. Between them they killed two walruses and one caribou. They plan to leave here tomorrow for Portland by way of Vancouver.

Passenger Plane Crashes at Kehl

Kehl, Germany, Aug. 13 (AP)—Czechoslovak passenger plane crashed here today, killing 11 persons and seriously injuring one. Details of the accident were not immediately available.

Air ministry officials, however, denied reports from Paris that a German transport plane en route from Cologne to Strasbourg was down, saying there was a confusion with the Czechoslovak plane disaster.

Death Sentence For Teachers

Moscow, Aug. 13 (AP)—Newspaper reports said today two male teachers in an orphanage had been sentenced to death in the town of Kazakh for organizing drinking parties and promoting immorality among children. Three others were sentenced to five years' imprisonment.

E. E. Laird Appointed

Portland, Aug. 13 (AP)—E. E. Laird, associate lighthouse keeper, was appointed to the position of assistant superintendent of the 16th district at Ketchikan, Alaska, the lighthouse service said yesterday. The appointment is effective September 1.

Portland, Aug. 13 (AP)—Portland's population for 1938 is 334,514. R. L. Polk & Co., directory publisher, estimated yesterday in a report to Mayor Joseph K. Carson.

Rogers-Post Memorial

Barrow, Alaska, Aug. 13 (AP)—A memorial so constructed it may in time serve as an aerial beacon was rushed to completion today in preparation for Monday's ceremonies honoring the late Will Rogers and Wiley Post, killed near here three years ago in a plane crash.

The 15 foot high monument, made of stone taken from the same quarry as Oklahoma's state memorial to Rogers at Claremore, is equipped with a conduit which will make future illumination possible.

The stone, two by three feet, is pink granite and weighs 550 pounds. It will overlook the lagoon where the famed humorist and aviator met death.

A seven foot square base three feet thick was erected on frozen clay beneath the bleak tundra. The base was designed by Vivienne Kellums, daughter of Dr. Homer F. Kellums, owner of Kellums' ranch in Delaware county, Okla. Miss Kellums is an art student at the University of Oklahoma.

Other persons here for the dedication are the Rev. Roy E. Curtis, Christian church, Hillsboro, Tex., and formerly of Pryor, Okla., Wilmer F. Sims, Hillsboro merchant, John Kayser, Chickasha, Okla., and Clarence Lee, Port Scott, Kans. They will assist the Rev. Kellums.

Beverly Morgan, daughter of Master Sgt. Stanley Morgan of the U. S. signal corps, who flashed first word of the Rogers-Post tragedy to the world, will unveil the marker Monday.
