Lebanon—The Red Cross swimming lessons which were closed for a week Saturday were so popular with both young and old that they will be continued for another week with Miss Lenore Soule, registered life-saving swimmer and instructor in charge. Rodent Control Gains

Lebanon—The proposed gopher control project which, if put into working, will serve 13,000 acres of Santiam lands, was one step nearer realization when Judge J. J. Barrett and County Clerk R. M. Russell affixed their signatures to it for the Lincoln county court. Copies were sent to the Corvallis and Portland offices immediately for the OK of WPA officials. Although the estimated amount required for materials such as bait and traps was slashed into one-half the original amount it is hoped that should the project receive federal assistance through WPA there will be a possibility of further moneys when required. A committee of men from this vicinity worked out the original plan and shaped it for federal project consideration.

Some of the features of the built-ins of this modern kitchen consist of a floor-to-ceiling cabinet for the storage of packed groceries and cooking utensils, a specially designed woodbox, a cabinet for the storage of farm records and bulletins, and a play cabinet for the children.

An interesting and new color treatment has been used throughout in the finishing of the walls, woodwork and accessories.

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Santiam Academy's Former Students Back

Five generations were represented among the hundreds that attended the annual reunion of former students and friends of the Santiam academy at Lebanon Sunday, from

one of the donors of the site, Jeremiah Ralston who, with Owen Kees, made a gift to the grounds in 1854 that is now the acreage of the most beautiful high school grounds in the state.

These were Jeremiah Ralston, his son, Charles Ralston, both deceased, two daughters and a son of the Charles Ralstons, Jack Ralston, Mrs. Maude Kirkpatrick and Mrs. Jess Landstrom, Hugh Kirkpatrick and Katherine Reeves, son and daughter of Mrs. Maude Kirkpatrick, and Harold and Maude Katherine Reeves, children of Ralph and Katherine Reeves, and Carl Landstrom, son of Mrs. Jess Ralston Landstrom and Sigurd Landstrom, and young Carl, their son.

"Dusty Roads" was the picturesque topic assigned to the reminiscence talk of the afternoon program, delivered by Will H. Ross of Portland, who was introduced by the program chairman, Mrs. Anna Steen Pratt. Ross has traveled extensively and finds the home scenes of the Santiam more appealing than those of foreign lands. He placed the home, education, a revival of spirituality and educational cen-

ters, such as the outgrowth of the Santiam academy, the needs of the country for recovery.

Joseph Swank, 95, who attended the academy in 1862, was present and was the honor guest of the affair. Mrs. Jess Ralston Landstrom presented a large basket of flowers to Swank in an impressive ceremonial.

Judge G. W. McKnight of Klamath Falls gave the address of welcome to the audience. Judge McKnight was a student at the academy 67 years ago.

Miss Mary McCormick, a teacher in the Portland schools, presided during the business meeting when the new officers named and elected by acclamation, were George Ross of Lebanon, president; Mrs. Anna Steen Pratt, vice-president; and Mrs. Maude Kirkpatrick, secretary.

James Burtenshaw was named secretary for the next year as permanent treasurer.

The late Luther Burtenshaw of Corvallis, speaker at the dedication of the grounds a number of years ago, died suddenly two months ago at his home. A brief memorial was observed in his honor.

J. G. (Don) Swan made the suggestion which passed as a motion that Judge G. W. McKnight, George Simons and George Ross act as a committee to compile facts concerning the life history of the academy as it is a vital part of the early history of the state.

Forty members of the Lebanon high school band, directed by Wayne Godfrey, played at intervals. Dean Stephens appeared in two vocal numbers. Elder George Simons offered the invocation, and a number of former students gave stories of reminiscences of the very early life of the school.

Only a few of the large group that gathered for the afternoon were present for the noon basket dinner. The program was held in the new auditorium of the Lebanon high school, built a few months ago after burning of the former auditorium on the site of the first academy building.
