

Animal Tests Are Under Way Again in Linn

Lebanon—Annual tests of cattle for tuberculosis, a disease which is now of minute proportions in eastern Linn county as compared to years ago, are again being taken by Dr. P. T. Tweed of Lebanon, county veterinarian in this area.

Dr. Tweed reports that a remarkable gain in eradication of this disease has been made since tests were started here about 12 years ago. While in 1926 about five per cent of the animals reacted, today the average has been cut down to less than one-eighth of one per cent. The veterinarian attributes success of treatment in large measure to the cooperation of cattle owners, who, he said, have been quick to realize advantages of sanitation and treatment.
