Auto Accident Damage Suit For Defendant

Albany—After deliberating for five hours and a half at the conclusion of a tedious 5-day trial, a Linn county circuit court jury brought in a verdict for the defendant in the case of Arley G. Redman vs. E. McGuire, denying the plaintiff his claim for \$53,896.44 for injuries he asserted he had received in a collision between the car in which he was riding and a logging truck driven by the defendant. The case was the outgrowth of an accident on the North Santiam highway near Minto creek, above Detroit on the night of September 24, 1937, in which Andrew Englis was killed. Redman alleged that McGuire's truck was parked with no lights showing, and that the car in which Englis and Redman were riding plunged into the logs that protruded from the truck's rear. The plaintiff suffered a fractured skull, damaged eye and other injuries, he alleged. McGuire alleged that Englis was driving at too rapid a pace and that the brakes of his car were inadequate.

Parole Is Revoked

Albany—Floyd Cole, who was paroled from a one-year penitentiary sentence by Judge L. H. McMahan last January, will start serving that term as soon as he completes a 60-day county jail sentence. Cole was placed in the county jail after pleading guilty to a petty larceny charge. He was originally convicted on a larceny charge, namely, for the theft of \$47 from R. W. Cooley. His parole has been revoked.
