## Cascadia CCC Camp Opening Date Set

Lebanon—Reopening of the CCC camp at Cascadia, closed several months ago when all of its enrollees were moved to Detroit, is set for November 15 or earlier, information learned yesterday disclosed. All of the Detroit contingent of 195 men will be transferred to Cascadia, and the Detroit camp closed. Lieutenant Sam Coleman, commanding officer at Detroit, will remain in charge.

The Cascadia camp will open earlier if weather at Detroit is unfavorable, according to R. C. Burgess, ranger of Willamette National forest at Cascadia.

Burgess said a crew of 15 men has been at work the past few days preparing the camp for reopening. New additions are being erected on buildings and one or two small structures being built.

The winter program of the contingent will include road work, erection and maintenance of telephone lines and improvements and repair of forest camps, according to the ranger.

## Council Fixes Minimum Wage On Waterworks

Scioto—Pursuant to request of the PWA at Portland, the city council of Scioto at its October meeting proposed tentative minimum wage rates for work on the waterworks project in event the proposal advances to that stage.

All requirements thus far made by the PWA in connection with the proposal have been met by the council and accepted by federal authorities, according to Councilman G. F. Bryan, who was named by the council some months ago to furnish whatever data the government should request in connection with the city's application for federal grant and loan.

The list of work includes something like 15 different classifications, varying from 65 cents to \$1.50 per hour. In view of the fact that the government required minimum figures, it is considered that wages may rule higher than those fixed by the council, if the project finally gets under way.

Steps were continued also looking to conveyance to school district 95 of lots 76-77-78-79, situated between the city hall and the school building. This tract is desired by the district for erection of the proposed new high school building, with federal financial participation approved a short time ago. This property was deeded conditionally to the city by A. J. Johnson 30 years ago.

Desire of the People's theatre of Scioto for elimination by the council of the license fee of \$10 per annum now in vogue was resisted by the municipal board by the decision that the license provision in this particular instance is applicable to the case at issue, in that the owners and operators of the local theatre are non-residents.

Budget for the calendar year 1939, as prepared by the committee appointed last month, was deferred without change. This provides for \$2,000 for running expenses, as for the present year.

The city marshal was instructed to post notices for the second time requiring repair of sidewalks at the Shelton estate residence property at Main and Race streets.

## Directors Dispose Of School Bonds

Silverton—At a special meeting of the board of school directors Tuesday night, \$74,000 bonds were sold to Conrad-Bruce & company of Portland for 2 1/2% par plus accrued interest as low bidders.

Landscaping plans, final alterations as to position of building and interior arrangement, are fast taking shape in regard to the new high school building. The Thanksgiving ceremonies of turning the first spadeful of earth for construction promises to be a gala event for Silverton school patrons.
