

Three Sisters Appear in Film From Noted Pen

"Four Daughters," the Warner Bros. picture of a famous story by Fannie Hurst, will open Saturday at the Elsinore theatre. A moving tale of four devoted sisters who fall in love with the same man, the film has one of the most unique casts in motion picture history.

Given stability by the presence of such tried and true performers as Claude Rains, May Robson, Frank McHugh and Dick Foran, the cast is made remarkable by a couple of striking circumstances.

First, it marks the only time in motion picture history when three sisters not only played important roles in the same picture but were, in fact, cast as sisters. They are, of course, the Lane girls, Priscilla, Rosemary and Lola. The fourth sister, incidentally, is played by Gale Page, who is said to fit beautifully into the Lane ensemble.

The Warner studio also chose this vehicle to introduce simultaneously two of the most promising young actors it has ever presented in its long history of star-making. of a century and as a result has a wealth of interesting information. The missionary's ministry of medicine includes 800,000 Africans representing the Batawa and Batonga tribes and covers a territory of 60,000 square miles. A hospital at Gikuli, staffed with competent native nurses, trained under his guidance, and 15 out-stations distant in the jungle, 50 to 300 miles by elephant trails, testify to his effectiveness. The 200-patient leprosyarium, with its 14 stone cottages, kitchen, dispensary and church, set in the midst of a tract of 500 acres, is operated under the missionary's direction.

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Enforcement of Dog Law Urged

Washington, Oct. 13 (AP)—Agriculture department officials urged today the strict enforcement of state dog laws to end a wave of sheep killing in several western states.

They said the problem of eradicating the wild dog—a domestic pet which has gone astray—required drastic action.

The officials said thousands of sheep were killed annually by roving bands of blood-hungry dogs. Most of the killings, they said, occurred on farms or nearby rangeland.

Most of the western states, officials said, had good dog laws, which, if enforced should go a long way toward ending the reign of the killer-dog. Generally, they provide for the licensing of all dogs and place the responsibility for damage on the owner. They also provide that the dog may be shot if caught worrying livestock.

The wild dog presents a greater problem for the stockman than the coyote or the cougar which kill only for food. The wild dog, once he becomes a killer, kills for the love of killing and often destroys entire barnyard flocks. He is seldom broken of the habit. Death is the only reformer.
