

10-Year Plan For Forests Being Formed

Washington, Oct. 13 (AP)—The forest service disclosed today it intended to spend nearly half a billion dollars during the next 10 years perfecting a system of highways, truck roads and trails in the national forests of the country.

This exceeds by approximately \$100,000,000 the amount spent in the past by the service in its road building programs.

Officials said the completed system would include 24,173 miles of first class highway, 113,356 miles of truck roads, and 182,840 miles of foot trails—all vital to forest administration and protection.

Approximately 1,116 miles of the forest highway system remain to be constructed, and at least 10,632 miles of existing road must be improved. This would require, officials said, an expenditure of approximately \$291,874,000.

The truck road program will involve construction of some 31,770 miles of rough automobile trail and the improvement of 32,002 miles of the 49,824 miles of existing road, at an estimated cost of \$120,838,800.

Officials said 17,690 miles of the 118,503 miles of existing foot trails would have to be improved and an additional 16,647 constructed before that phase of the program was complete. This would involve an expenditure of about \$4,435,700, they said.

Much of the work will be done in the western states, where the larger national forests are located, but the program will reach into 39 of the states, Alaska and Puerto Rico before it is completed.

Contemplated expenditures for forest highways, truck trails and foot trails, respectively, by states, include:

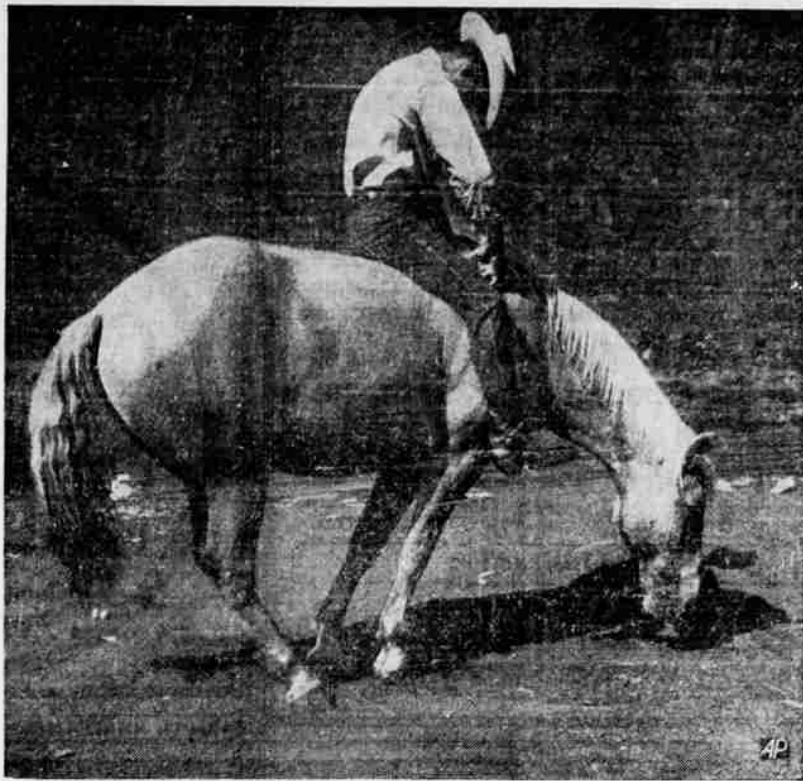

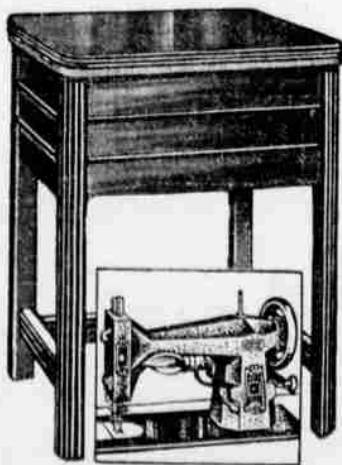
