

Hitler Fudges In Map of New Frontier

London, Oct. 13 (AP)—An official map received in London Wednesday disclosed Adolf Hitler had carried his new frontier with Czechoslovakia forward to the line corresponding roughly to those of his Godesberg map which Prime Minister Chamberlain refused to accept.

The map came from the international Sudetenland commission now sitting in Berlin and shows the limits of the fifth zone of German occupation approved by the commission.

The new frontier gives Germany an area approximately equal to that of the Godesberg demands, although only in a few cases do the lines coincide with the Godesberg lines. There are variations of five to ten miles either way throughout, some favoring the Czechs as compared with the Godesberg map, others favoring Germany.

At the Munich conference and afterward it was asserted in British quarters Hitler had not gained all he asked of Chamberlain at Godesberg on the Rhine on September 22.

Germany's biggest gain, according to the commission's map, was made north of Prague, where the final settlement puts the border 25 miles from the Czechoslovak capital and 10 to 25 miles south of the Godesberg line.

On the other hand, the Czechs gained near Pilsen, where the frontier will not enter the actual town as it was expected to do. Similar changes from the Godesberg line favoring Czechoslovakia appear all along the south and southwestern frontier.

Another German gain is to the west of Mährisch-Ostau, in northern Moravia, where the line passed through a large area in which Hitler originally demanded a plebiscite.

The feeling is growing in informed London quarters Germany might be satisfied with the Czech concessions already embodied in the fifth zone and that plebiscites in additional territory might be waived.

Airplane Making Waits on Business

Berlin, Oct. 13 (AP)—Igor Sikorsky, American airplane manufacturer, told the Lilienthal society for aetial research Wednesday construction of exceptionally large transoceanic airplanes was an "engineering possibility," but must depend on business conditions.

Sikorsky spoke at the opening session of the society's annual meeting, attended by 150 delegates from 24 nations.

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Smith Freed After Arrest

Juneau, Alaska, Oct. 13 (AP)—Forrest B. Smith, 44, was at liberty on his personal recognizance today as U. S. marshal's deputies investigated his claim he fatally shot Oliver Colling, 44, of Seattle, steward aboard the steamer Tongass, when he found Colling in his home with his wife.

His wife denied there had been any intimacy between her and Colling, either aboard ship or at the Smith home here. She contended Colling went to the Smith home to show her how to make a certain kind of salad dressing she had enjoyed aboard ship.

Assistant District Attorney George Polta said Smith told him he had suspected his wife and Colling and told her he was going hunting yesterday. Instead, Smith's statement said, he returned home and hid in the house.

He heard Colling call at the house and enter, then hearing suspicious movements, he burst into the room, his statement continued. When Colling advanced on him, Smith said, he fired two shots in self defense, one striking Colling in the heart.

In Seattle today Mrs. Jeannette B. Colling, 53, Colling's white-haired widow, sought funds for a proper burial for her husband.

She said "It is hard to believe he died under the circumstances described. He had always been faithful to me."

Smith was freed after a hearing in which he was found not guilty of the murder of Colling.
