Borleske Has Reserves for All Positions

Walla Walla, Nov. 21 (AP)—Mindful of the fact that their fullback, Jim Morrill, last November smashed across the Willamette goal for the first touchdown a Northwest conference eleven had scored on the Bearcats in five seasons of play, the Whitman Missionaries will invade Salem Thanksgiving day with firm conviction they can repeat the Pacific university upset of 10 days ago.

The 20-7 defeat of Colorado college here Armistice day with both Morrill and his beefy running mate, Bill Martin, on the bench, fired the Missionaries with ambition. When news followed that Pacific had broken the long Willamette victory string, the lads in maize and blue vowed that a string of six consecutive drubbings by their oldest rivals must be snapped, too.

Only two seniors will go into action for the Borleske men Thursday. They are Captain Dan Gray, tackle, of Seattle, and Karl Schneidmiller, triple-threat back, of Walla Walla.

Whitman will face one of the heaviest lines the Missionaries have had in many years—and with plenty of reserves for a change.

Purced to worry along most of the season with the hard-crashing Morrill and the shifty but hefty Martin on the sidelines, veteran Coach Nig Borleske has found sophomores Harry Hellberg and Jim Cozens, and freshmen Bud Long, Wayne Eaton, Don Dumont and Johnny Lewis capable running mates for his veteran quarterback.

Whitman's early season record, which showed losses to Whitworth and College of Puget Sound, was attributed to inexperience that brought mistakes at crucial times. Against Linfield and Colorado college the Missionaries made few mistakes and they dominated play in both divisions.

"This has been the most rapidly developing team I have coached in many years," Borleske said. "When they are clicking, they can make it interesting for any opposition."

The Bearcats probably will find the following foes in blue jerseys opposite them Thursday: Gordon Sawyer, Phil Raykovitch, Norm Tranter, Alfred Rasmussen and Frank Hansen, end; Captain Dan Gray, Jim Hamby, Don Miller and John Storie, tackles; Wes Price, Phil Graue, Howard Gilliam and Tom Evenden, guards; Al Aschenbrenner, Merle Wagoner and Bill Smith, center; Karl Schneidmiller, Harry Hellberg, Wayne Eaton, Jim Morrill, Bud Long, Jim Cozens, Jim Martin, Don Dumont, Johnny Lewis and John Linder, backs.

Gigantic Grid Bowl Program Texas Plan

Fort Worth, Tex., Nov. 21 (AP)—Texas today announced a huge-scale bid for first place in the annual football "bowl" Rose Bowl at Pasadena. This

was revealed to the United Press by Roosevelt and confirmed by Sanford today and involves a series of events that includes two bowl football games within a period of three days between four outstanding American eleven and other features that would drive Cecil B. De Mille or Billy Rose into fits of jealousy.

The program hinges on the result of the final game of undefeated Texas Christian university's schedule. If the great horned frog team emerges from a hard season still undefeated, machinery will be put in motion immediately to carry through. Invitations will be sent to President Roosevelt, governors of all southern states and to the four outstanding football eleven.

Two of the teams will be T.C.U. and Texas Tech. The other two will be selected from Tennessee, Oklahoma, Duke, Pittsburgh, Notre Dame, Carnegie Tech and others. T.C.U. now ranks second to Notre Dame in the national ratings. Texas Tech, also undefeated, has whizzed like a meteor across the football horizon during the last few years and will be the selection to play the first of the two games—on Saturday preceding New Year's day—while T.C.U. will be invited to play on Monday following. Both games will be played in the Dallas Cotton Bowl, which will be enlarged for the double event to seat between 60,000 and 70,000 fans.

Salem Plays Corvallis Hi Thursday P.M.

High school football in Oregon began to play out over the week-end and a handful of Thanksgiving day games will be the finish for 1938.

Highlights of the meager schedule Thursday, Friday and Saturday included Jefferson's 7-0 decision over Grant that nailed the Portland prep title for the democrat; Salem's 20-0 romp over Silverton after the capital city's bitter loss a week ago to Eugene; Medford's 21-6 suppression of Grants Pass that left the southern Oregon team still undefeated although once tied.

The Portland champs, unable to schedule a state-title game with the unbeaten-united McLoughlin eleven of Milton-Freewater, slated a Thanksgiving fracas with the powerful no-name league leader, Milwaukie. Milwaukie tuned up by overpowering Gresham, 26-0. Salem was the only team to beat Milwaukie this year and the Vikings did it by a scant 20-19 margin. Salem will play Corvallis turkey day on the latter's gridiron.

Medford, unbeaten but tied by Hood River, lined up a Thanksgiving cross-state game with Mac-Hi last week contingent upon Ashland's willingness to call off a Southern Oregon league game on that day and forfeit. Ashland refused so the prospects of Mac-Hi appearing in a late season game of state title significance dwindled.

Columbia prep ran up the big nine league flag by beating Hill Military, 14-0.
Chandler of Tigard blocked a Hillsboro punt and recovered the ball for a touchdown that enabled Tigard to tie the Beaverton for the Tualatin-Yamhill league lead. The score was 7-0.

Ashland played the only interstate game of the week, losing to Arcata, Calif., 31-21.
University high of Eugene and Marshfield struggled to a 13-13 tie. Myrtle Creek's six-man team whipped Oakland, 52-6.

Mark Temple's The Dalles team beat Pendleton, 7-6. Temple coached at Pendleton last year.
Thanks to some artistic punting by Lemmon, Corvallis managed to tie Beaverton, 0-0, despite Beaverton's 12 first downs and 268 yards.

Scappoose beat Canby, 19-7, but suffered so many injuries the school had to cancel its Thanksgiving game with Clatskanie. Lebanon whipped Dallas, 27-13. Woodburn beat Molalla, 38-6. Pacific U. Frosh beat Newsers, 19-0, and Franklin beat Roosevelt, (both Portland) 13-0, in other games last week.

The biggest crowd of the week outside of Portland again was drawn by a southern Oregon team. Medford and Grants Pass played to more than 3,000.

Rose Bowl or Milk Route For Trojans

San Francisco, Nov. 21 (AP)—This unpredictable Pacific Coast conference football race swings into the home stretch this week, and it might mean the Rose Bowl or back to the milk route for the hard-galloping Southern California war horse.

A Thanksgiving day crowd at Los Angeles will see U.S.C. hook up with the Bruins of University of California at Los Angeles in what has developed as the most crucial game of the season.

California wound up its season Saturday with a narrow and lucky 6 to 0 win over Stanford. The Golden Bears have won six games and lost one—to U. S. C. Southern California has a record of five wins and one loss—to Washington.

The ten members of the conference would vote on the western Rose Bowl representative in case of a tie for the championship, and in view of the decisive U.S.C. victory over California it is expected the Trojans would get the invitation.

Ken Priestley, the University of California graduate manager, argues however in case of a tie between U.S.C. and California the Bears should get the bid because they are defending champions, and as in the prize ring the champ retains his title in case of a draw.

Eastern opponents for the January 2 classic at Pasadena seem narrowed down to Texas Christian, Tennessee, Duke, Villanova and perhaps Oklahoma.

The other conference encounter last Saturday provided another of the season's many surprises. At Portland, University of Oregon nipped the comeback aspirations of Washington by scoring a 3 to 0 victory on a second-period 23-yard field goal by Halfback Jim Nicholson.

Next Saturday Washington State will play Washington at Seattle, and Oregon State will meet Oregon at Portland in conference battles while the international flavor will be provided by Dartmouth's powerful squad in a game at Palo Alto with Stanford.

4 Sectional Clubs Crowned

New York, Nov. 21 (AP)—Four sectional football champions are sporting brand new crowns that can't be knocked off until next season; the 1938 campaign is practically over in some regions; but the big question of which teams are to be rated the best in the nation, which two will meet New Year's day in the Rose Bowl and in other post-season games, still is to be decided.

Most of these problems probably will be ironed out this week when the Thanksgiving day classics and next Saturday's climax games bring the season almost to its end.

Last Saturday saw the Big Ten campaign close with Minnesota on top again; Oklahoma complete its sweep of Big Six honors; Duke walk off with the Southern conference crown; Utah take the title in the Rocky Mountain Big Seven and California clinch at least a tie for Pacific coast conference honors.

Each of these new champions has a claim of some sort to high national ranking, but there are other claims which must be considered. The "major" unbeaten and untied teams are Georgetown in the east; Notre Dame and Oklahoma in the Midwest; Texas Christian in the southwest, and Tennessee and Duke in the south. Texas Tech and Western Reserve may be as good as some of these but they haven't been able to prove it yet.

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
