

Ruth Etting Tells of Attack By "The Gimp"

Los Angeles, Dec. 13 (AP)—Torch singer Ruth Etting, who signed herself "Nutsy" in a telegram to pianist Myrl Alderman, faced cross-examination today on her accusation that Martin (The Gimp) Snyder shot Alderman at the musician's Hollywood Hills home last October 15.

Miss Etting first took the stand yesterday at Snyder's trial on six felony charges—three of attempted murder, two of kidnapping and one of carrying a gun with the numbers filed off.

In the same throaty voice which brought her fame as a blues singer, she charged Snyder, her husband and manager for 17 years, with threatening her life and with wounding Alderman in the abdomen as he sat on a piano bench in the music room of his residence.

She painted a picture of a cursing Snyder forcing Alderman at gunpoint into the home where she and Snyder's daughter, Edith, were preparing dinner, and announcing "he had us all where he wanted us."

"Waving a pistol," Miss Etting testified, "he forced us into the music room and told us this was the end of all three of us."

She said Edith Snyder cried "If you're going to shoot, shoot!" and her father snapped back, "I told you to sit down."

"Then," she declared, "Myrl opened his mouth and Snyder shot twice—and then the light went out. Mr. Alderman fell off the piano bench on his face. I screamed."

"Then Mr. Snyder said: 'I've had my revenge. Now you can call the police.'"

She described rushing to the bedroom to get a revolver which "because of his (Snyder's) recent threats" she had taken to Alderman's house.

"He came after me," she continued, "and we met in the bedroom. He made a grab for me. I had the gun behind my back and it exploded."

She fled, she said, when Edith ran into the room and separated them. As she ran from the house, she heard another shot and saw Snyder dash past her and into the street.

She divulged how at the time of her divorce she gave Snyder stocks and securities valued at \$75,000, a half interest in her Beverly Hills home and paid off \$50,000 of his gambling debts. Since then, she said, he had tried to obtain more money from her.
