

Trojans Plan to Match Quick Kicking of Eric Tipton

Anderson, Day Slated for Punting Duty

Los Angeles, Dec. 21 (AP)—The brilliant punting of Eric (the Red) Tipton, of the Duke, will be met—and the Trojans hope offset—by the quick-kicking strategy of Southern California when the two stierens clash in the Rose Bowl.

Tipton's kicking fame is well known to the men of Troy, but may be the staunch Duke of North Carolina will find it matched by those bounding boots sent downfield by the Trojan quarterbacks when the downs and the formations apparently call for an orthodox running play off tackle.

Notre Dame learned of one of Coach Howard Jones' favorite maneuvers last December 3. Time and again Mickey Anderson or Oliver Day set the Irish deep in their own backyard by these lightning-like thrusts, which ranged from 38 to nearly 60 yards.

Ohio State and some other Trojan foes found out about these quick kicks, but in the battle with Notre Dame they were the most outstanding.

Duke, with Tipton doing almost all the kicking, has an enviable season's average of 46.3 yards, but it doesn't begin to tell of the 60, 70 and more yards on individual punts by the Duke star, nor of how the powerful Tipton foot helped topple mighty Pitt.

In another answer to the Duke punting, however, Southern California has several better than ordinary safety men. Grenville Lansdell, first string quarterback, who isn't a great punter compared to his understudies, Anderson and Day, rates as one of the most spectacular broken field runners in the Pacific Coast conference. He took an Ohio State punt and ran it back 83 yards for a touchdown, and traveled 71 over a mushy, treacherous turf at Seattle to score Troy's lone touchdown against Washington.

Anderson arrived yesterday and after a brief tuning-up period, at Lake Placid, will take off on a transcontinental tour, ending with a competition to be held at San Francisco, February 18-19.

Two former Albany high school lads, Vic and Homer Greening, combined with the fast floor work and sharp shooting of C. Martin of McMinnville to defeat Albany. Gosler, Albany, tied with Martin for high scoring honors, with 11 points.

The Albany team came to life in the third and fourth quarters to outplay and outscore the visitors, but was unable to overcome the lead piled up by the visitors early in the game.

Lowly Cards Take National Honors at Bat

New York, Dec. 21 (AP)—Slugging honors in the National league last season went to the St. Louis Cardinals, individually and collectively, although even in the middle of winter this must seem an empty reward for the gas house gang, who finished sixth, while the Chicago Cubs won the pennant without a player in the top 10 sluggers and finished fifth as a team.

Official figures released today by the National league showed Johnny Mize was the leading avastemith with 326 total bases in 531 times at bat for a slugging percentage of .414. Joe (Ducky-Wucky) Medwick, also of the Cards, led in runs batted in for the third consecutive year with 122. And the team as a unit led the league in slugging and runs batted in.

Mize's lead was based on his 27 triples, most in the league. It was the veteran Mel Ott of the New York Giants who led in home runs. Collecting 36, for an easy second in the slugging column with a .583 percentage. Ott in receiving bases on balls with 116, brought his record of 100 or more free trips to first base a season to six years. He also was hit three times in one game by balls pitched by Jim Tobin of Pittsburgh to tie a 28-year-old record.

Cincinnati had three hitters among the slugging leaders—Ival Goodman, Ernie Lombardi and Wally Berger (who also played a few games with the Giants)—and finished only one point behind the Cards in slugging.

The 10 leading sluggers were, in order: Mize .614; Ott, .583; Medwick, .536; Goodman .533; Lombardi .524; John Rizzo, Pittsburgh, .514; Dolph Camilli, Brooklyn, .485; Berger, .478; Ernie Kay, Brooklyn, .468; Babe Phelps, Brooklyn, .437.

Miscellaneous marks of the season included Vince DiMaggio of Boston striking out the most times for the second consecutive year.

Oregon Club Wallops Miami

Cleveland, Dec. 21 (AP)—The University of Oregon basketball team, on a 7000-mile barnstorming tour of the east, defeated the Miami University cagers of Oxford, Ohio, 74-38, at Cleveland's public hall last night.

The Oregon Webfoots played virtually without their outstanding star—Urgel Wintermute, towering six-foot-eight center, who turned his ankle in the first period, and Lauren "Laddie" Gale, who played only briefly.

The Oregon team left last night for Buffalo, N. Y., on the next lap of the tour.
