

Off the Record

Details of the Willamette Valley project would be handled under a three-man commission if a bill he is introducing in the 40th legislative assembly becomes a law, according to Senator Douglas McKay, of Salem, serving the first district as a second term member of the upper house. Senator McKay is chairman of the project, a position he has held since its creation. He is chairman of the important roads and highway committee and holds membership on committees on industries, medicine, military affairs, rules and unemployment.

Getting jobs and results has been his record since college days, when he was president of the associated student body at OAC (it was then). Perhaps his Scotch ancestry has had something to do with this record. Though he is a republican all his family in the past have been democrats.

Senator McKay went into legislative activity after a brilliant career in Salem where he was mayor, president of the chamber of commerce and of Salem Community Service. He found time also to serve as post commander of the American Legion, president of the Oregon State Auto Dealers and president of the OSC (correct this time) alumni association. He was born in Portland, June 24, 1893, establishing an automobile agency here in 1927, after selling insurance and automobiles in that city for several years.—C.K.L.

Linn County Ledger Is Still in Black

Albany—Linn county finished last year with fund balances totaling \$415,236.09, according to the semi-annual report of Grover C. Nance, county treasurer, for the last half of 1938. This total was found after a \$10.06 rebate reduction, and it includes a \$276,924 balance carried over from July at the end of the first half of the year. It includes courthouse funds exceeding \$270,000. The balance is distributed among the several major funds, the largest of which is the sheriff's deposit account of \$109,231.26 with the next largest account being that of the general fund, of \$54,824.

Minor accounts in other funds account for the remainder of the balance. Hearing Tests Given Students Lebanon—Only a small percent of the Lebanon school pupils who were given hearing tests Tuesday and Wednesday of this week reacted unsatisfactorily, results received by Superintendent Milton E. Coe reveal. Of the 520 examined in all day examinations Tuesday and in the morning Wednesday, 21 were reported to have defective hearing of any serious nature, or four percent. The tests were conducted by Pauline Keller and Dr. G.D.C. Thompson of the state board of health. Reports have not yet been learned here of the results of the examinations given to students of several rural schools in this neighborhood Wednesday morning and afternoon. Tests were to be resumed this Friday morning for pupils of the upper two high school classes and later in the day for pupils of other rural schools in this section.
