Eleven More Linn 4H Clubs Receive Charters

EDITORIAL

Nearly 50 years ago, in 1893 to be exact, Rev. J. L. Green and his wife arrived in Woodburn from Nebraska and that night held a cottage prayer meeting. From that originated the first Church of God camp meeting which five years later first was held in the fine 10-acre fir grove just north of the city limits, an annual place of congregation for 33 years. During the growth of the institution buildings were added, including an auditorium erected 26 years ago which seats between 800 and 1000 persons which is still in use during the services held annually for ten days during July. Daily average attendance is from 400 to 500, with over 1000 attending the Sunday services. Modern conveniences of all kinds have been provided for those housed in 150 to 200 tents each summer.

Ministers come from many western states and missionaries from foreign countries during the camp meeting. At a recent conference in Portland plans were completed for a new building 20 by 40 feet to house the missionary display and which will be in use for the first time at the encampment this summer. The spirit of the pioneer minister, who now preaches at Hubbard, still prevails and the members of the pastorate of Rev. H. S. Fulton, of Woodburn, are turning out to erect their own building as soon as weather permits. Members from other communities are volunteering their services for this work and through the cooperative efforts of the congregations a building, the need of which has long been felt, will be available at a minimum expense. — C.K.L.

Commercial Filbert Blanker Presented

Silverton—Silverton folk and the people of Marion county, or any others who are interested, will be given an opportunity to see the filbert blanker miniature in operation with every portion in exact duplicate of the commercial sized blanker manufactured by Eastman Brothers, Inc. The miniature will be on display at the two world fairs, San Francisco and New York, within the next few months.

Eastman Brothers have arranged to have the miniature blanker operating in their plant showroom in North Water street Saturday, February 4, beginning at 9 o'clock.

Arthur Foster, field representative of the two fairs for the Oregon division of exhibits, spent a day here recently and arranged for the completed miniature to be placed in the San Francisco exhibit room in the Oregon booth between February 12 and 15. The fair is to open February 18.

The work of the blanker is done by air pressure, which can be adjusted to within 1-200ths of an inch. The machine segregates the filberts, taking out those not matured at one point, and those slightly filled at another point in the circular trip of the nuts.

Loss from this first fire of 1939 will be at least twice that of entire 1938, when total loss was recorded at \$386.
