

Hearing Tests Given Linn County School Children

Child Welfare Reports Will Show Averages

Albany—A county-wide series of hearing tests throughout Linn county during the last three weeks, included 2133 children who submitted to the audiometer tests. It was announced by Mrs. Jean Park, county health nurse, who assisted Pauline Keller, state board technician.

Whether or not the county's young people are above or below average in hearing, however, will not be known until figures are received from Carle Thompson of the maternal and child welfare division of the Oregon state board of health.

In Albany 796 children of the grade schools are included in the total, included also are 338 Lebanon grade and high school pupils; 133 grade school pupils at Sweet Home; 123 at Seio; 182 at Brownsville; 88 at Harrisburg; 41 at Shedd and 42 at Halsey.

Grade school children between the third and ninth only were examined.

Eightieth Birthday Brings Recollections

Monmouth—Mrs. Fannie B. Guthrie is observing her 80th birthday today. When she was five, her father, John Wesley Davis, helped form a wagon train of 104 vehicles to come to Oregon. He served as captain of the train, and his wife drove a horse-drawn wagon from New Mexico, Mo., to Portland. They suffered no losses from Indians, although little Fannie Belle scared the entire camp when she hid in a freight wagon while 50 Sioux warriors prowled about, devouring frying bacon and other supper provender. When their chief arrived on horseback he cracked a whip and the brave, hideous in war paint, beat a hasty retreat.

Fannie Belle was missing. The whites thought she had been carried off under an Indian's blanket. At last she was discovered hidden in the wagon. Her father had forbidden his children to get into any wagon at camp, but she escaped punishment because of the rejoicing over her safety.

They reached Portland on October 24, 1884, and camped at the foot of Stark street. Small cabins, mostly of hand-hewn logs and lumber, were scattered about, and the streets bore names evidencing a belief in future growth.

The Davis family settled at Rickman, Polk county. There Fannie Belle was married to Harvey E. Guthrie in 1876. They followed farming, and were engaged in hop-growing near Salem during the depression of the '90s. In 1900 they moved to Monmouth, which has been their home since, Guthrie died several years ago.
