RADIO Day by Day

Time in Eastern Standard New York, Feb. 13 (AP)—It's possible to predict long distance short wave radio reception with fair accuracy. One man has been doing it for years, and his average for correctness runs around 85 per cent. He is W. A. R. Brown, NHO engineer, who started delving into the possibilities of such a forecast 10 years ago. While he can forecast as far ahead as a year to a certain extent, his predictions for the immediate days ahead hit the point more closely.

Brown's forecasts are based partly on sun spots and partly on observations made on the variations of the earth's magnetic field, all of which affect radio. While his predictions are intended mainly for use of the network in arranging overseas pickups, Brown has expressed a willingness to let listeners learn what to expect. He has agreed to issue a periodic forecast, that for this week will be:

"Short wave reception from Europe rather erratic, with best signals in the middle of the week. South America likely to be as strong as usual. No severe magnetic storms expected."

"Well, there were so many political funerals of defeated democratic candidates last fall," remarked this democrat, "probably it took all the cash for flowers for these obsequies and left the state chairman in a bad way."

Army Maneuvers Darken Roseburg
Roseburg, Feb. 13 (AP)—Roseburg was plunged into darkness Saturday night while army reserve officers directed defense tactics against a simulated enemy air raid.

The first blackout attempted in west coast maneuvers was accomplished within a few seconds of the warning siren. Reserve officers from western Oregon and northern California attending the contact camp as observers, used short wave radio, re-broadcast through a commercial station, to direct the blackout and defense.

Effectiveness of the blackout was checked by military observers from numerous points in nearby hills and on buildings. They said only a dozen scattered lights showed and reported the experiment highly successful. Defense measures taken in handling the tactical problem were credited with "saving" the city, railroad station and yards from bombardment.

Navy Maneuvers In Caribbean

Washington, Feb. 13 (AP)—The United States navy began its annual maneuvers today with the greatest peace-time concentration of fighting strength in the Caribbean sea.

It will be the first time since 1924 that maneuvers have been held in the Atlantic. Observers believe they will go far toward determining the potential effectiveness of the navy's ability to patrol the western world in accordance with President Roosevelt's newly-projected continental defense program.

Involved in the naval war games will be 140 ships, including all of this country's battleships, 55,000 enlisted men, 3000 officers and 600 planes. Fighting ships participating will include 12 heavy battleships, nine light cruisers, 60 destroyers, 16 heavy scouting cruisers, 14 training battleships and 12 training destroyers.

"Fleet problem 20," the tactical problem which the navy will attempt to solve, involves separation of the fleet into two groups, the "black" and the "white" fleets. The black fleet will defend the Panama canal against attempts by the white fleet to penetrate defenses.

The war games will continue for three weeks. War time security surrounds plans of each fleet, newspapers and radio are barred from the area. President Roosevelt, tentatively planning a Caribbean cruise beginning the end of this week, may see some of the maneuvers from the deck of the cruiser Houston.

Extortionists Confess Plot

St. Paul, Feb. 13 (AP)—An attempt to extort \$15,000 from Charles A. Ward, president of Brown & Bigelow, one of the largest advertising specialty houses in the country, was frustrated when Ward and St. Paul police trapped the conspirators, who are held today at police headquarters.

Held on charges of attempted extortion are Matthew W. Stegbauer, 31, an ex-convict, and Harold McAvoy, 29, both of St. Paul. Police said Paul Contreas, 40, was released but later they said he was being held as a material witness, after it was discovered he was an innocent messenger in the case.

Charles J. Tierney, assistant chief of police, said Stegbauer and McAvoy have confessed. Tierney said they admitted they were the real plotters and Contreas was not implicated.

When Ward received the typewritten extortion letter last Friday morning he got in touch with Tierney. The note said both writers were ex-convicts and in need of money. The note declared they had information which would connect Ward with the murder of Walter Liggett, Minneapolis editor, several years ago, and unless he sent \$15,000 to Wall's bar they would use this information against him.

The note said they would "swap" this information for \$15,000 in ten dollar bills.

Bill Provides Hospital Care For Indigents

All persons having a motor vehicle license of any kind will be assessed an additional 50 cents per year to be paid by the secretary of state to the state treasurer as a motor vehicle accident fund to provide hospitalization for indigent patients injured in any motor vehicle accident, under a bill offered today by the house committee on medicine, pharmacy and dentistry.

Only persons coming under benefits of the workmen's compensation laws are exempted and all others unable to pay for hospitalization at the expiration of 90 days would have these bills paid through the office of the state treasurer, who is custodian of the fund.

Hospitals are required to file monthly reports of the details of the treatment accorded each person who comes under the act. An affidavit is required from the injured person, or in event of a fatality, a statement from the proper county official that the person hospitalized is unable to pay for the services received. The hospitals will receive monthly payments for claims approved. Necessary expenses of handling the fund are deducted from the fund.

The bill provides that the rate charged such patients by the hospital shall not exceed a reasonable compensation for the services offered but shall not exceed in any case more than \$5 a day.

State departments were being operated under skeleton crews Monday owing to the holiday. The state liquor store was closed the entire day and will also be closed February 22 in observance of the birthday of George Washington.

Figures are not yet available as to the additional electric light and power expense in connection with the legislature but persons familiar with the situation estimate that the state's power bill for the building will be double the normal amount.

Frank Branch Riley Eulogizes Lincoln

Frank Branch Riley, master orator, of Portland, in eloquent and simple language, eulogized Abraham Lincoln before the Salem Chamber of Commerce today noon. From the martyr president's humble birth in Illinois to the assassination, the career of Lincoln was pictured, and the speaker concluded by saying that "though he is dead his voice still speaks to the worker, to the statesman, to the patriot."

Our institutions were menaced then by insurrection. Today they are menaced by disintegration, and Lincoln's voice calls to us after 75 years to save the principles of democracy."

Mr. Riley was able to speak with unusual authority because of pilgrimages made by him to many places closely associated with Lincoln's life, including the place of his birth and the place of his death in a little boarding house in Washington, which he described as "then an abiding place for the poor and the lowly, now a shrine of the nation."

He spoke tenderly of Lincoln's first and only love, ended by the death of Ann Rutledge, and of his subsequent turbulent married life with Mary Todd. "Abraham Lincoln was probably the most patient husband and the most indulgent father in history," he said.

Lincoln, he said, never used any of the tricks of oratory, yet he became "the greatest orator of them all." Effectively he described the war days when Lincoln, as newly-elected president, had to overcome the scorn and intrigue of cabinet members and political associates.

Mr. Riley was introduced by Dr. P. O. Riley of Salem, also an orator of reputation. They are not relatives.

After the address, colored motion pictures of the Chamber of Commerce attendance, marching from the dining room, were made by J. T. Anderson.

Ralph P. Riggs, 64, Photographer, Dies
Ralph P. Riggs, 64, died suddenly at the family residence, 980 Marion street, late Sunday afternoon. He was a well known photographer and for 11 years served as official news photographer for the Oregon Journal.

He returned to Salem from Portland nine years ago and had specialized in commercial photography. Ralph P. Riggs was born in Polk county, near Dallas, February 23, 1874, the son of John L. and Camilla Riggs, Oregon pioneers. He attended Willamette university.

Services will be held from the Clough-Barrick chapel Wednesday, February 15, at 1:30 p.m. Interment will follow at Cityview cemetery.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Jean L. Riggs; daughter, Miss Lois Riggs; nephew, L. L. Riggs of Portland.

Charges were made on the floor of the house this morning by the joint judiciary committee through Representative William M. McAllister, of Medford, that great inaccuracies were a daily occasion in one Portland newspaper because its representative was unable to attend the morning sessions because he stayed up all night and thus had to obtain his information second hand with the resultant misrepresentation.

Farmers Plan Barter Deals With Germany

Washington, Feb. 13 (AP)—German sources said today negotiations were under way for extensive barter deals between Germany and Midwest organizations of farmers and packers.

Under such deals, which official American sources said could be handled by non-governmental agencies without any special permit, the farmers and packers might exchange their agricultural goods for German manufactured articles.

The negotiations began, German sources said, when representatives of cooperative farm organizations asked the German commercial attaches in Chicago, a Dr. Fricks, whether a pure barter arrangement could be effected.

Shortly thereafter the cooperative representatives were said to have come to Washington to see Dr. Wilhelm Tannenberg, first secretary of the German embassy.

Tannenberg and Fricks told them, it was said, Germany would be glad to enter into barter arrangements for land and wheat, taking several hundred tons of land and 150,000 tons of wheat.

Pure barter is permitted by a regulation of the United States treasury of December, 1938. It has been used by California fruit growers and Virginia apple growers who exchanged fruit for German fertilizer.

Secretary Hull said last week he did not object to pure barter so long as it did not interfere with his trade agreement program. He said he did object to barter accompanied by artificial currency devices.

Ruble Offers Plan for Jews

London, Feb. 13 (AP)—George S. Rublee, director of refugee work, submitted to an inter-governmental committee of 32 nations today a memorandum, drawn up by agreement with the German government, on the future of German Jews.

It was understood the first part of the memorandum envisaged the emigration of 150,000 to 200,000 able-bodied German Jews, who would finance the emigration of their dependents and relatives as soon as they established themselves abroad and were earning money.

The second part was said to contain assurances from the German government of better treatment for Jews awaiting their turn to emigrate.

In the third part, the memorandum was said to indicate that Germany could not permit Jews to take abroad any more property than under present restrictions. However, it was said to propose a trust fund of Jewish money in Germany, on which emigrating Jews could draw for a proportion of their wealth (1) for transportation to countries of settlement insofar as the charges could be paid in marks, and (2) for equipment and machinery which they would require in their new homes.

Rublee handed his resignation to the committee after he had submitted his report. He intends to sail for the United States at the end of this week.

Norcross to Speak Before Kiwanians

David Norcross, field secretary for the National Council for the Prevention of War, will be the forum leader for the Problems in Democracy class, room 30, old high school auditorium at 8 o'clock tonight. He will appear before the Kiwanis club as the Marion hotel Tuesday noon.

Norcross has been addressing Salem churches, schools and clubs during the past week on the general subject of America's foreign policies and what can be done to keep America out of war. "Shall America Scare the Dictators?" will be his subject this evening. Everyone interested in international relations is invited to be present.

At noon today Willamette university YMCA and YWCA held a no-host luncheon in honor of Norcross, who spoke and led the discussion on "Should Young Men Die to Settle Old Men's Quarrels?" In addition to other factors, it was pointed out that economic inequalities between nations and peoples will continue to bring about civil and international wars. Willamette university students recently voted overwhelmingly against participation in foreign wars.

Miner Rescued By CCC Workers

Medford, Feb. 13 (AP)—A group of CCC enrollees rescued John C. Chaney, Kings mountain district miner, near the Jackson-Josephine county line last Thursday after he had fallen exhausted from battling a snow storm for 12 hours.

Dr. E. H. Porter, CCC physician, said Chaney collapsed while trying to reach Rogue River for food. His wife was alone in the isolated cabin, safe but nearly out of food, CCC searchers learned.

Body Taken From River Identified
