

Safety Program Is Continued by Silverton Council

Traffic Rights Are Discussed And Action Seen

Silverton—The Silverton safety council had an enthusiastic meeting at the weekly session with Herman Kramer presiding. A lengthy program for the sake of saving lives in the traffic zones was outlined. The safety organization is an advisory and investigation board and passes their suggestions on to the city council for definite action.

Chief of Police Omar Halverson reported the plans completed for another driving school. The safety council endorsed the request of the Lions club that the merchants park their cars off the city center blocks which, with the backing of the mayor, Zetta Schlador, may get action at the April meeting of the city council.

Something new in one-way streets for Silverton was talked by routing north incoming traffic by Grant and North Water and outgoing by way of Pine and James streets.

Many adverse reports were presented the safety council concerning the condition of the Silverton-Salem highway and the group asked surface roughing on the dangerous spots and that the WPA workers park their cars entirely off the highway as the roads are too narrow for the safe passing of two cars with a third taking up a portion of the right-of-way.

Property owners on East Hill have been interviewed and are generally favorable to a sidewalk on the east side of the road, reported Lester Standard. A reflector was asked placed at a dangerous curve on east hill highway.

The group would have bicycles numbered in order to help in enforcing of the city ordinance in respect to the use of bicycles.

Another Motorist Skids Into Ditch

Leonard, did the "whirl and ditch" act just over east hill on the Marquam road as the young people were returning from Corvallis where Bob had driven to bring his sister home from the State college where she is a student, to spend the weekend.

This is the identical place on this highway where the average of a car a day skids in wet weather and goes in the ditch. Most of the automobiles come in contact with a telephone pole but the Leonard car stopped short of the pole Friday night after making a complete whirl heading in the opposite direction from the way they were traveling.

Local citizens are becoming anxious to have this spot in the highway roughed as the motorist has no warning whatever of the condition of the road until his car starts to skid.

Public Welfare Cash Has Small Monthly Decline

Albany—Cash totaling \$15,350.23 was paid out last month in relief through the agency of the Linn county public welfare commission, formerly the county relief committee. It was reported at the welfare commission office Saturday.

This is \$1424 less than was paid out in January. The total includes direct cash assistance, old age assistance, assistance to the blind and aid to dependent children.

Old age recipients numbered 488 who received \$5931.75 in February. Dependent children were allotted \$1755 last month; direct relief was administered in 221 cases to 718 persons, who received \$4,800.54. Blind assistance was given in the amount of \$263 to 11 persons.

Railroad Given Verdict
