

# Webfoots Square Off Against Oklahoma Squad Tonight

## Skits and Scratches

If Peoria, Ill., has a hall of fame, they are probably preparing a couple of niches for two native sons who have done well in "foreign fields"—Howard Maple of Salem and Harold Hawk of Salem high via Willamette. Both young men are products of Peoria and came west to secure their college education. "Mapes" went to OSC and Hawk cast his fortunes with the Bearcats. The former won the Northwest conference basketball title this spring while Hawk's peppers demonstrated a great brand of hoop playing to annex the state crown. The two men showed initiative when they decided to get out of the "Sucker" state and head toward the west. Salem is fortunate in having coaches of their ability and standing to ride herd over the younger generation.

Reactions from the 20th annual tournament are beginning to arrive via the exchange table. John Hogg, sports writer of the Baker Democrat-Herald points out: "The Salem-Baker game . . . was the roughest it has been the displeasure of these eyes to see. It was not the fact that the referees, Tuck Hodgins and Jack Lloyd of Echo and Imbler, were calling fouls on the Baker team, it was the fact that they were not calling fouls on any aggression. Hodgins and Lloyd are good fellows . . . but almost everyone I talked to mentioned that the refereeing they did was the worst of the day. The Salem Vikings have a great team, there is little doubt about it, and they do a lot of hard checking and close checking that is extremely bothersome to the opposing team." "Had Filina and Heniges, who were released to officiate the Oregon-California series, been allowed to referee as they were supposed to at first, it is my firm conviction that the Bulldogs would have played in the final game."

Everybody is entitled to his convictions, but the scorebook shows that twice as many fouls were called against Salem as against the Bulldogs. The fouls were largely due to the fact that Hawk's boys were trying to stop Colson, who, despite their efforts, piled up a total of 21 points, including nine free throws. Lloyd and Hodgins called 24 fouls in the Salem-Baker game, which is slightly more than the average for the entire series. During the 27 games 540 fouls were called by the five officials, or an average of exactly 20 per contest. The most fouls were whistled down during the Astoria-Corvallis game when Heniges and Coleman called 31 infractions. There was no doubt but that the Salem-Baker contest was a free-wheeling affair, but when 16 fouls are tabulated against the winners as against eight for the losers, there can be little grounds for intimidation that favoritism was shown.

Calling of a foul on Susick, North Bend guard, in the final second of the game against Medford, to our mind, was one of the poorest bits of officiating of the tournament. That a foul was committed we do not question, but in view of the fact that so many more flagrant infractions had been overlooked, made the one called against Susick seem trivial to say the least. This was especially true in view of the closeness of the foul and the gun. Throwing the affair into an overtime period would have been much to be preferred. (Some one give me a whistle).

## Oregon Drubs Texas, 56-41, First Round

San Francisco, March 21 (AP)—University of Oregon's Pacific Coast conference champions clash with a powerful University of Oklahoma team tonight to decide a western division winner to play Ohio State at Chicago March 27 for the national collegiate athletic association championship.

Oregon whipped University of Texas, 56 to 41, in last night's semi-final, and Oklahoma, leaders of the Big Six, eliminated Utah State Agricultural college, 50 to 39.

Texas, which lost only four of 23 games in winning the Southwest conference title, was obviously outclassed by the tall Oregonians.

Oregon led at the half, 19 to 18, and after that pulled away with Forward John Dick, Guard Wally Johansen and Center Urgel (Slim) Wintermute zipping in field goals from all angles.

Laddie Gale, the Oregon forward who led the northern division of the conference in scoring this season, tired badly and was replaced in each half. High scorer was Wintermute, a six-foot-eight boy who was outstanding in the tight defensive play that held the Texans to a single field goal in the first 12 minutes.

The Texans were forced to try long shots when they could not work the ball through the tight Oregon defense. Midway in the second half Oregon held a 19-point lead.

Oklahoma impressed the crowd of 3000 gathered in the coliseum at the Golden Gate exposition with amazing ball control and a fast-breaking offense. The Oklahomaans were ahead at half time, 24 to 14, and dominated the game throughout except for a time early in the contest when the score was deadlocked at 10-10.

The Texans made a fight of it even after Oregon appeared safely in front. Held to one point for six minutes they trailed by seven points when they put their first rally in motion. Again Oregon pulled away and stretched its margin to 16-5 when Bob Moers, all-Southwest conference guard, flung the Texans to a drive that chopped Oregon's lead to one point shortly before the half ended.

Oregon took command in the second half with John Dick, forward, and Wally Johansen teaming with Wintermute in a scoring display that soon removed all doubt as to the winner.

## Bowser Named At Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh, March 21 (AP)—The mantle of two men who for two decades made the University of Pittsburgh's football teams a power on the nation's collegiate gridirons—Glenn S. (Pop) Warner and Dr. John Bain (Jock) Sutherland—fell today to a student of both, Charles W. Bowser.

Bowser was named last night by the board of trustees that at the same three hour closed session appointed a committee of seven to investigate "all phases of the stormy situation at Pitt."

The new head coach entered Pitt in 1919 and displayed equal adaptability in the classroom and on the gridiron. As honor student, he played guard, tackle, quarterback and center under Warner.

Graduated in 1923, he went to Grove City, Pa., college, later becoming head coach, served three seasons as an assistant under Sutherland at Pitt, then went to Bowdoin as head coach. He gave up football after the 1934 season to devote full time to his (insurance) business here, but returned to the Pitt staff in 1935. He resigned as first assistant to Sutherland after the 1937 season, remaining out of the game last year.

## Indians Need Lady Luck to Finish Higher

New Orleans, March 21 (AP)—A two-day study of the Cleveland Indians has convinced me they will need plenty of luck to finish as high in the coming American league race as they did in the last, when they wound up third after buckling in the latter stages.

"I'm pretty certain I saw three clubs in Florida—New York, Boston and Detroit—that will take the Indians' measure. Their once great pitching staff is beginning to fall apart, and they still are inadequate at second base and shortstop.

The Indians for the past several seasons have been able to count upon Mel Harder, Johnny Allen and Bob Feller to give them brilliant pitching on about three days out of four. But now it looks to me like they've lost Allen, and that's a blow they can't survive.

Allen hurt his arm pitching in the last all-star game at Cincinnati after having set a phenomenal record for the first half of the season. During the winter they split open his elbow and removed one of those "spurs" that have become fashionable with our tossers.

Even if by some miracle the wing finally comes back completely, Allen won't be ready to pitch before the first of May.

The team's veteran shortstop, Lyn Lary, a holdout, finally pulled into camp yesterday and signed his 1939 contract, but his position seems to be occupied by Jimmy "Skeeter" Webb, of Meridian, Miss.
