Monmouth—Date for the annual state convention of the Farmers' union, which will be held this year in Monmouth, has been set for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, May 23, 24 and 25. The convention opens Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock.

National Vice-President Kennedy of Nebraska will represent the national organization. He was president of the Nebraska state Farmers' union for several years and is recognized for his outstanding service in the forming of cooperatives.

An all-day session, which marks the quarterly meeting of the Polk county Farmers' union will be held at the north Dallas schoolhouse Wednesday, April 12.

Plans for the junior educational contest for the present year will be decided. The topic for discussion this year is "How Can Socialized Medicine Benefit Us?"

An elimination contest for the county must be held before May 20, according to rules of the state junior department.

Two Bond Issues Are Approved at Silverton

Sewage Plan And Pool are Voted Again

Silverton—Voters of Silverton yesterday approved two bond issues at a special election. These will provide for the completion of a new sewage system and the construction of a public swimming pool, both WPA projects.

The sewage proposal carried 331 to 90. It provides improvements costing \$110,000 with the city contributing \$30,000 through the bond issue, the remaining \$80,000 being supplied by the government for wages.

Voters approved the swimming pool 269 to 154. The pool is restricted to one of tank type, the plan to construct one in Silver Creek being rejected because of type. The \$6000 bond issue approved will be boosted \$12,000 by WPA funds.

The bond issues were similar to those approved at a regular election February 6 which was ruled illegal because notice was given one day short of the required time.
