EDITORIAL

One hundred years ago this month a Catholic priest said the first mass in a log cabin church near St. Paul and the hierarchy of the church is paying tribute to the beginning of Catholicism in the Willamette valley, culminating the three-day centennial event at Oregon City May 11.

Disregarding the denominational aspect of the celebration, its commemoration is such as should interest the secular and laity from a strictly historical viewpoint. Center of this interest is St. Paul, not far from the "birthplace" of the Oregon territory at Champeau, recognition of which has been general for many years.

History reveals that all frontiers were first pierced by the clergy, both Catholic and Protestant, and upon these early contacts established there the seed of Christianity was sown that is being harvested by the civilization of today. People interested in the history and development of the Willamette valley will find this centennial a fertile field of information and with benefit to themselves attend such sessions as are of interest to the public.—C.K.L.
