

Silver Falls Moving to Portland for Rose Festival

Float Reveals Natural Beauty Of Noted Park

Silverton—The Silverton-Mt. Angel Rose Festival float is being decorated with the last of five tons of moss from Moss lake, and will be on its way to the Terminal in Portland Thursday for the final wetting down and the placing of flowers which will simulate the Silver Creek Falls, the flax industry and a gold throne for lovely Queen Evelyn and her court of princesses.

Bob Goodall, landscape artist of the Silver Falls CCC camp, is the designer of the float and Miss Isabel Tracy, head of the art department of Silverton high school, is in charge of the decorating work. The float is at the Everett Cramer storage garage. More than ten men are working on the float and many young people are getting flowers by the thousands.

Space to be covered with ferns and flowers of pink, golden, white and blue shades is 988 square feet. The queen's throne is at the front of the large truck, the white flower falls among green ferns is at the rear and so high that this portion couldn't make clearance into the garage.

Twelve women will drive to Portland to assist Miss Tracy in placing the flowers.

Moss Lake Gives Float Backing For Rose Parade

Silverton—From three to five tons of moss are being sawed and removed from the famous Moss Lake near Silverton to furnish a damp background on the Mt. Angel-Silverton float for the masses of flowers that are being arranged under the direction of Miss Isabel Tracy, Silverton art teacher.

The removal of the moss requires the services of five husky men at a time as the chunks of the material, being wet, are unusually heavy.

The float was being constructed in its earlier stages at the CCC camp near Silver Creek Falls, and is being finished at the Winlock Handle factory.

Silverton City Council Passes Upon Business

Silverton—A number of the regularly scheduled plans of the Monday night meeting of the Silverton city council was crowded aside with a thought of apprehension when L. C. Eastman, ex-mayor, explained his presence on the side lines as a mediator between several substantial citizens of town and the mayor, recorder and members of the council.

The whole thing, by mid-afternoon, Tuesday, slumbered down to a loose construction of a good broad definition of the limit and intent purpose of an outfall sewer and just what it might connect with.

Inquiries showed on cross-examination between the water commission and the city council.

Along the line of advertising, Mrs. Schlador, mayor, explained that on June 24 a half-day would be given over to the ceremonial dedication of "The City of Silverton" bus christening, with this application on the front side of the bus and a plaque engraved with "Silverton, Oregon, Gateway to Silver Creek Falls" placed inside the bus in sight of the passengers.

The application of Lloyd Moser was received for sewer ditching and laying of pipes. This will be acted on at a special meeting. Dance license was refunded the Silver Falls employees for the baseball benefit affair. A communication was read from Boatright of the Salem WPA office asking for an estimate of men needed for the sewage improvement project and also stating that work on the swimming pool and bath house could not start until after June 30.

Barr and Cunningham voted approval of a pump under a FWA project in connection with the disposal plant. Three bidders were rejected, temporarily, for water chlorinating equipment. Resolution 280 was passed, having to do with the acceptance of properties in lieu of street assessments payment.

Ordinance No. 292 pertaining to parking and loading zones, did not pass the first reading.

Harold W. Adams, superintendent of schools and clerk of the district, asked the aid of the city in grading and opening a street on the south side of the new high school building. Harry Cameron, financial chairman of the summer recreational program, asked aid of the council.

Revival Campaign Interesting Stayton

Stayton—Rev. Perry McArthur is now holding revival meetings at the Methodist church each evening at 8 o'clock. This is his 17th revival. Rev. McArthur has worked in 28 states and has seen better than 7,000 conversions. He has placed 43 young men in preparation for the Christian ministry.

He was chaplain of Arizona prison and received the final confession of the noted woman prisoner, Ruth Judd, just 12 hours before her scheduled execution.

Court Battle Rages Over Missing Girl

Albany—When Deputy Sheriff Mike Southard went to Harrisburg Monday to serve a writ of habeas corpus upon Mrs. Anne Walton, demanding that she surrender to him her 14-year-old niece, Elaine Bulloch, he found that neither Mrs. Walton nor the girl were in Harrisburg and returned without serving the papers.

This left indefinite the next step that George Bulloch, Pasadena, Calif., will take to gain possession of a child, which he alleges in his petition for the writ, was born to his ex-wife soon after their marriage was annulled in Texas.

Bulloch asserts that he and his wife, Mazide Bulloch, were married at Honolulu, T. H., in 1924, but that he had brought about annulment on the ground of fraud because he had subsequently found that she had previously been declared an incompetent.

Thereafter, the petition recites, Mrs. Bulloch was committed to the Oregon state hospital, where she died in 1935.

Meanwhile the daughter had been "forcibly held and imprisoned" by Mrs. Walton, Bulloch alleges, all without his consent or authority of a court order. Mrs. Walton is said to be a sister of the late Mrs. Bulloch.

Bulloch contended to District Attorney Harlow Wehrlich that he has been appointed guardian of his daughter by a Pasadena court.
