

National Benedictine Educational Association Opened

Coast is Host Second Time To Dignitaries

Mt. Angel—With the arrival of dignitaries and delegates from all over the United States earlier this week, the 22nd annual convention of the National Benedictine Educational association opened Wednesday morning at St. Benedict's abbey, with a solemn votive mass in honor of the Holy Ghost, celebrated by the Rev. Eugene Medved, O.S.B., rector of Mt. Angel.

The opening session was held at 9:30 a.m. with the Rev. Felix Feller, O.S.B., of St. Vincent's archabbey at Latrobe, Penn., reading the first paper entitled, "History of Benedictine Education." Three sessions are being held each day during the three-day convention.

The Rt. Rev. Abbot Alcibiades, O.S.B., of St. John's abbey, Collegeville, Minn., president of the American Cassinese congregation, is presiding at the meetings and the Rt. Rev. Abbot Lambert Burton, O.S.B., of Lacey, Wash., is secretary of the association, having held the position for many years. Abbot Lambert was also the chief influence in the foundation of the association.

Also among the visiting dignitaries is the Rt. Rev. Abbot Procopius, O.S.B., of Chicago, Ill. Delegates from 25 schools conducted by Benedictines in 22 different states are here for the sessions, with the Rt. Rev. Abbot Thomas Meier, O.S.B., of St. Benedict's abbey, Mt. Angel, as host to the convention visitors.

The Rt. Rev. Abbot Lambert Burton, O.S.B., celebrated the pontifical high mass in the Abbey chapel preceding Thursday's sessions. Friday evening the delegates will be honored at dinner at the Benedictine convent.

Following the convention the delegates will be taken on a trip to the Oregon coast, with a seafood dinner being arranged for their honor at Tillamook, and later they will visit the Mt. Hood loop.

This meeting marks the first time the convention has been held here and only the second time it has come to the Pacific coast, having been held at St. Martin's college in Lacey, Wash., in 1937. The purpose of the meetings is to enable Benedictine educators from all over the country to discuss their problems and formulate plans to promote American Catholic education.

Besides the delegates from all over the United States, the Rev. Bruno Mayer, O.S.B., of the famous Beuron Abbey in Germany, and the Rev. Sigismund Toenig, O.S.B., of Kremsmuenster Abbey in Austria, are also attending the convention.

Purchase of Resort Nears Realization

Lebanon—The proposal that the state purchase the Cascadia resort and establish it as a recreational park was believed nearer realization following a meeting of the state

highway commission with Senator Samuel M. Garland of Lebanon, Judge J. H. Barlett and Commissioner H. A. Remington of the Linn county court, and Commissioner W. H. Malone and Clerk A. J. Moore of the Benton county court.

The state officials indicated they would make an investigation at an early date of the offer of the present ownership to sell the grounds and otherwise evince their interest in the proposal.

Early action was advised by the visiting officials who pointed out that a mortgage is soon to be foreclosed. The price has been set at \$15,000 by the present ownership. The tract of approximately 140 acres includes the famous springs which have drawn thousands of visitors, and is estimated in a recent survey to contain more than four million feet of standing timber.

Independence Fires Alarm

Independence—A fire at the Dick Chittenden hop ranch, across the river in Marion county, from Independence, destroyed about 30 tons of hay, hay barn, together with considerable quantity of loose hay in a field adjoining the barn. It is thought that the fire was caused from spontaneous combustion although the hay was baled for the most part.

It took hard fighting on the part of hired help and neighbors to save the adjoining buildings, consisting of hop houses and dwelling. A large machine shed filled with machinery went up with the rest. It was a very hot fire and is still smoldering among the ruins.

The Independence fire department was called out for a fire in the hop bowl Wednesday morning but it did not prove to be disastrous. A pot of hot roof paint was boiling over near the rear of the buildings on Main street. Some repairs are being made to the roofs. No damage was done to the hop bowl.

Thomas Creek Bridge Crossing Seems Assured

Scio—Bridge work by the Linn county crew contemplates a new crossing on Thomas creek in Scio at an estimated expense of approximately \$10,500, according to report from the county board of commissioners.

Construction work is scheduled for October 1. The bridge is to be somewhat lower, wider and longer than the present structure, according to specifications submitted to bidders by bridge engineers.

Straightening of the jog on the west side of Main street, as considered in early plans for a new bridge here, has been eliminated from the present contract. It is stated. Such work would have necessitated moving the ZCJB hall several feet west.

The present bridge on Main street, which is a county unit, although within the corporate limits of the city, has been in service for many years and is thought virtually to have outlived its usefulness. Ban on loads exceeding eight tons was officially posted last year. Vibration under exceptional tonnage during the heavy log traffic by the White company last season prompted officials to caution users of the possible danger of the span in order that the county might be released from liability in event of accident.

Recent bridge and road work in the Scio vicinity included a new bridge near the Jay Oglesbee farm a short distance north of Shelburn. This improvement was reported greatly needed, as residents in that particular community often were marooned for days at a time during winter freshets. It is stated this condition will be completely eliminated by the new bridge and by road repairs.

The detour bridge in Scio, approximately two blocks west of the present county bridge on Main street, is expected amply to take care of all forms of traffic during construction of the new crossing.

Silverton Greet Methodist Pastor

Silverton—Rev. Edward Terry, the new pastor of the Methodist church succeeding Rev. D. Lester Fields, is arriving in Silverton today and will occupy the pulpit for the first time, here, Sunday.

Rev. Terry will speak at his new pastorate in Lebanon, but the family will not move from Silverton until several days later.

Rev. Terry was formerly pastor at Canby and was assistant pastor at Centenary-Wilbur, Portland. He comes to Silverton from North Bend.
